Re: Informational Item - Update to City & Regional Planning Electives

The City and Regional Planning program proposes an update to their elective requirement. The proposal reduces the required major elective hours from 21 to 18 and increases free electives from 18 to 21, keeping the total degree hours at 120. This adjustment is intended to improve scheduling flexibility, streamline degree process and better align the program with peer accredited planning degrees

They request this update be effective AU26.

The Engineering College Committee on Academic Affairs met on February 25, 2026 and reviewed this proposal as an Informational Item. There were no questions or concerns and a College-level record of support for this proposal was created.

Re: Proposed Curriculum Change in BSCRП related to CRP Elective Requirement

Proposal:

To reduce the number of required CRPLAN elective credit hours in the Bachelor's in City and Regional Planning from 21 to 18 and increase the open electives requirement from 18 to 21. The overall number of credit hours required to graduate (120) will not change as a result of this proposed change.

Goal:

The intent of this proposed curriculum change is to enable students pursuing the Bachelor's in City and Regional Planning (BSCRП) to complete their degree more efficiently. This change is also intended to make transferring to the BSCRП from other degree programs, both at Ohio State and elsewhere, less onerous.

Context:

The Bachelor's in City and Regional Planning at Ohio State is an externally accredited degree program that was created in 2009. Over the last decade, an average of 36 students have graduated with the BSCRП per academic year. As of Autumn 2025, 105 students are enrolled as majors in the BSCRП, with an additional 8 students pursuing a Double Major (M2) in CRP. In 2022, the Bachelor's of City and Regional Planning increased the number of required CRPLAN elective credit hours from 12 to 21, as part of a broader curriculum revision. The 2022 curriculum change also included adding new required core courses in City and Regional Planning (total CRP Core credit hours was increased from 40 to 46) and two non-major requirements, in Computer Science and Public Affairs. Overall, the 2022 curriculum change has resulted in desired outcomes but the significant increase of required CRP elective credits has presented several challenges for our students, including course scheduling and overall flexibility in order to graduate in a timely fashion.

Key Considerations:

- A. Comparable undergraduate programs in planning, also accredited by the Planning Accreditation Board, require fewer CRP-specific elective credit hours.
 - a. The Bachelor's of Arts in Urban Studies and Planning at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign requires 15 CRP-specific elective credit hours. The required core in planning at UIUC consists of 37-39 credit hours, namely 28 for their "foundation" courses and 9-11 additional credit hours in a required concentration. <https://catalog.illinois.edu/undergraduate/faa/urban-studies-planning-ba/#degreerequirementstext>
 - b. Michigan State's PAB accredited Bachelor's of Science in Urban and Regional Planning requires 12 credit hours of CRP elective courses, on top of 35 credit hours of planning courses in their core. https://reg.msu.edu/AcademicPrograms/ProgramDetail.aspx?PType=UGRD&Program=UPCANR_BS1
- B. The BSCRCP attracts a significant number of transfer students who have taken elective courses, at Ohio State or elsewhere, prior to their decision to pursue the BSCRCP as their major. A minority of BSCRCP students start in our program in their first year in college. In the last 5 academic years, an average of 10 students have started their freshman year in college as a BSCRCP major. This means that the degree program generally attracts an additional 26 students per graduating class after the first year. Based on anecdotal evidence, this appears fairly typical for undergraduate degree programs in planning, as a relatively unknown field, both academically and professionally. Many of these transfer students have already taken one or more elective courses prior to joining the BSCRCP and seek to transfer these credits to their BSCRCP requirements. This adds a significant workload to the Chair of Undergraduate Studies, as each course substitution request needs to be assessed individually. Reducing the CRP elective credit hour requirement will make it possible for these transfer students to use up to 3 additional credit hours for the "open" electives requirement in the BSCRCP.

Implementation:

This proposal foresees the changed requirement to become effective at the start of Autumn 2026. The new Curriculum Sheet that is attached in Appendix A will become active in Autumn 2026 as well. Therefore, students graduating immediately following the Autumn 2026 semester can use that curriculum sheet.

Decision-making:

- On Monday, Jan. 25, 2026, the faculty members in the CRP Undergraduate Committee unanimously voted in support of changing the CRP elective credit hour requirement from 21 to 18, while increasing the Open elective credit hour requirement from 18 to 21.
- On Monday, Feb. 09, 2026, the CRP faculty voted in support of this curriculum change proposal.
- The Knowlton Academic Affairs Committee voted in support of this proposal on Wednesday, 02/18/26
- This proposal was forwarded to the College of Engineering on Monday, 02/20/26 for inclusion as an informational item.

Appendix A: Updated Curriculum Sheet for BSCR

- A minimum of 120 total credit hours. Remedial coursework (English 1109; EDUTL 1001, 1002, 1003, 1004, 1005, 1006, 1007, 1010; Mathematics 1040, 1050, 1073, 1074, 1075) do not count toward the 120-hour minimum requirement for the BS degree.
- If a major-required course or major elective is a GE Theme course, two 3-4 cr courses (no more than one per theme area) is permitted to double count in the GE and major hours. GE Theme courses are indicated with a ❖ symbol. There is no limit on overlap between the GE Foundations courses and other coursework.
- Students are encouraged to participate in education abroad opportunities. Consult with your advisor for how education abroad credit applies to your degree.
- Courses required in the major (including major-supporting courses and major electives) may **not** be taken pass/non-pass.
- Coursework taken as open electives may include a maximum of 4 credit hours of physical activity courses (all 1139-1197 courses), and a maximum of 4 credit hours of campus music organizations.
- A maximum of six hours of individual studies courses (x193) can be applied toward graduation; some majors may have a lower maximum.

Policies and General Requirements for Minors/Minor Equivalent

- The minor/minor equivalent must contain a minimum of 12 credit hours distinct from the major and/or additional minors (i.e., if a minor requires more than 12 credit hours, a student is permitted to overlap those hours beyond 12 with the major or with another minor).
- A 2.00 cumulative point-hour ratio is required in the minor/minor equivalent with a minimum C- grade for any course to be listed in the minor or minor equivalent (includes transfer credit).
- For programs requiring a minor: minors should be declared by the time students complete 60 hours.
- A student is permitted to count up to 6 credit-hours of transfer and/or EM credit in the minor or minor equivalent.
- Coursework graded Pass/Non-Pass cannot count in the minor. No more than 3 credit-hours of course work graded S/U may count toward the minor. Maximum of 3 credit-hours of xx93 are allowed to count in the minor.
