- Completion of 45 points for required benchmarks (Honors and Graduate Coursework; Research, Scholarship and Teaching; Leadership and Service)
- Require completion of an Honors-enhanced ePortfolio, aligning with the University Honors standards

Undergraduate Honors Program Proposal

College of Dentistry, Division of Dental Hygiene

August 4, 2025

RE: Proposal to update DHY Honors curriculum and requirements:

Introduction:

The Division of Dental Hygiene Curriculum Committee is proposing several changes to the curricular honors requirements for the Bachelor of Science (BS) in Dental Hygiene. The dental hygiene honors requirements were last revised in 2012 during the transition from quarters to semesters. To align with the new University Honors Program Standards, the Division of Dental Hygiene (DHY) proposes to update the DHY Honors program to require students to fulfill the following components:

- 1. Minimum of 18 credit hours of Honors-Quality courses
- 2. Completion of 45 points for required benchmarks (Honors and Graduate Coursework; Research, Scholarship and Teaching; Leadership and Service)
- 3. Require completion of an Honors-enhanced ePortfolio, aligning with the University Honors standards.

Rationale:

The Honors and Scholars Faculty Advisory Committee approved a new University Honors Standard in May 2023. College units are expected to adopt the new Honors Standards within their own programs. The proposed changes to the DHY Honors program will align with the University Honors Standards. DHY plans to implement the revised program beginning with students who first enroll in Ohio State University beginning Autumn Semester 2025.

Updating to the new University Honors Standards coincides with needed updates to the DHY Honors program, namely revising the points required to complete the DHY Honors requirements and expanding options for required benchmarks to increase program accessibility. The existing DHY Honors program requires students to complete a minimum of 80 points from the following categories: Honors and Graduate Coursework; Research, Scholarship and Teaching; Leadership and Service in order to graduate with honors in dental hygiene. As requirements in the Dental Hygiene program have continued to evolve to meet accreditation requirements and industry standards we see less students completing the Honors program in DHY in order to focus on licensure requirements.

The basic structure of the DHY Honors program will remain the same, however, there is a need to update the points associated with each category and adding new opportunities to earn points in each category.

Proposed Revisions:

The first proposed change is to align with the new University Honors Standards: 18 credit hours of Honors-Quality courses (instead of six Honors courses). The Honors-Quality course definition has been updated to encompass a wider range of courses, not solely H or E-designated courses, due to a limited amount of H/E courses offered outside of 1000-3000 level GE courses. In the existing DHY honors requirements students are required to complete six honors courses prior to starting in the DHY program and a minimum of six credits while in the DHY program. The new University Honors Standards requires students to complete 18 credit hours of Honors-Quality course work prior to graduation and allows for more flexibility while progressing toward degree completion.

The following options fulfill Honors-Quality courses:

- Honors (H-designated) or Honors Embedded (E-designated) courses
- 4000-level or higher courses outside of primary major program requirements (GE, 2nd Major, Minor, and electives are eligible)
- Research credits with faculty

- Independent Study credits outside of the primary major program with faculty
- Study Abroad credits (up to 9 credits)
- Graduate level courses (by permission)

The second proposed change is to develop four new honors embedded courses in the DHY program. Developing courses within the dental hygiene curriculum will provide students an opportunity to enrich their hygiene academic experience. Currently the DHY program has one honors embedded course DENTHYG 3210E available for students pursuing the honors program to complete from within the major. The DHY program plans to adapt the following courses in the current curriculum into honors embedded courses; DENTHYG 2400 – Scientific Inquiry, DENTHYG 3400- Research Application and Analysis, DENTHYG 4193 – Individual Studies in Dental Hygiene, and DENTHYG 4430 – Dental Hygiene Capstone.

The third proposed change is to reduce the number of points required for DHY students to complete the DHY Honors program. The existing DHY Honors program requires students to complete a minimum of 80 points from the following categories: Honors and Graduate Coursework (minimum 24 points); Research, Scholarship and Teaching (minimum 15 points); Leadership and Service (minimum 15 points) in order to graduate with honors in dental hygiene. Students are required to achieve a minimum in each category, however, they need to exceed the minimum in some categories to earn the full 80 points. The proposed revision will require students to complete a minimum of 45 points from three categories: Honors and Graduate Coursework (minimum 18 points); Research, Scholarship and Teaching (minimum 15 points); Leadership and Service (minimum 10 points) and two points that can be earned in either Research, Scholarship and Teaching or Leadership and Service in order to graduate with honors in dental hygiene.

The revision allowed us to evaluate the amount of points awarded for tasks assigned in each category and remove barriers for students that want to finish the DHY Honors program. It also provided the opportunity to add new tasks that would help students enhance their educational experience and eliminate items that may no longer be relevant for our students completion.

Implementation:

Students who first enrolled in Ohio State University during Autumn Semester 2024 and beyond will follow the new honors program, as it will align with the implementation of university honors standards. Current DHY Honors students can graduate under their existing Honors requirements or update to the new requirements.

Student Eligibility:

Students can either be admitted to OSU as Honors students or earn Honors status by completing 12 credit hours of college coursework at OSU and earning a 3.5 CPHR or higher and then applying for Honors. All eligible students must enter the Honors status no later than autumn of the second year and have a plan for completing 18 Honors-Quality credit hours.

College of Dentistry Approval Process:

The proposed changes were brought forth and discussed within the Dental Hygiene Curriculum Committee. The proposal was evaluated and approved by the Division of Dental Hygiene Curriculum Committee, the College of Dentistry Associate Dean of Pre-Doctoral Education and Student Life, as well as the full dental hygiene faculty on April 30, 2025.

DHY Honors Requirements Prior to AU24

Yearly Honors Program Requirements

End of DENTHYG 3 year - Cumulative OSU GPA of 3.5, dental hygiene GPA of 3.5, completion of six honors or upper division courses, and completion of at least 30 points or recommendation of faculty advisor.

Graduation

Students need a minimum of 80 points for graduation with honors in dental hygiene. These points must be earned from each of the three categories 1) honors and graduate coursework; 2) research, scholarship and teaching; and 3) leadership and service. Students who complete 80 points to include an honors thesis will graduate with honors research distinction in dental hygiene.

- 1. Honors and graduate coursework At least 24 points must be earned by completing Honors courses or graduate-level courses while an undergraduate student. One point is earned for every credit hour completed. A minimum of six (6) points must be within the dental hygiene major.
- 2. Research, scholarship and teaching At least 15 points must be earned by completing research, scholarship, and teaching through the following opportunities:

3. Leadership and service: At least 15 points must be earned by completing service and leadership activities, which go beyond the clinical and service – learning requirements for the major. Service projects must be approved in advance by the faculty advisor and documented following completion of the project. Each activity may count in only one of the categories below.

Graduation

Students need a minimum of 45 points for graduation with honors in dental hygiene. These points must be earned from each of the three categories 1) honors and graduate coursework; 2) research, scholarship and teaching; and 3) leadership and service. Students who complete 45 points to include an honors thesis will graduate with honors research distinction in dental hygiene.

Additional Criteria:

- Honors students are encouraged to take a significant portion of their General Education coursework at the Honors or upper division level, in order to capitalize on the enriched learning experiences incorporated into the design of these courses.
- All courses must be graded A-E to meet Category A requirements.
- If an Honors Thesis is counting in Category B, students cannot also count Honors research courses (4999H, 4998H, etc.) on Category A. If not counting thesis in Category B, students can count up to 6 hours of 499X in Category A.
- o Unlimited counting in Category A if the minor/major IS NOT being used in Category B
- 6-credit hour maximum in Category A if the minor/major IS being used in Schedule B
- English 1167H cannot be counted in Category A.
- If credit from another university transfers to Ohio State as an Honors course, it can count on the Honors Contract.
- Honors Survey courses cannot count on the Honors Contract.
- If an Honors course from another university transfers to Ohio State as a non-Honors course (but was completed as an Honors course at the original university), it will count on the Honors Contract (maximum of 9 points).

- Buck-I-Serv trips meet service requirements rather than education abroad requirements.
- For peer-reviewed journals and publications: student can be anywhere on author list. Will count on Honors Contract if already accepted, or if submitted and under review.
- For undergraduate research journals: student must be first author. Will only count on Honors Contract if already accepted
- Completion of 4193 research hours cannot be double counted in Category A and/or a thesis.
- Information on the Second-Year Transformational Experience Program (STEP) can be found at: https://step.osu.edu/. Verification of meeting attendance, approved proposal, and project completion from faculty advisor will be required.

<u>Category C: Leadership and Service</u> - At least 10 points must be earned by completing service and leadership activities, which go beyond the clinical and service learning requirements for the dental hygiene major. Service projects must be approved in advance by the dental hygiene honors advisor and documented following completion of the project. Each activity may count in only one of the categories below.

Additional Criteria:

- For an experience to meet Category C requirements, students cannot be compensated in any way for their time, including monetarily or through course credit.
- Leadership positions must be held for an entire academic year. If an experience is only held for one semester, it will not meet requirements. Half points are not permitted.
- Buck-I-Serv trips meet volunteer service requirements. They do not meet education abroad requirements. Students are only permitted to count the hours spent volunteering on the trip and not the miscellaneous hours (i.e. traveling, eating, free time, sleeping, etc.). Depending on the trip, most students serve 30-40 hours.

Honors e-Portfolio:

Submit a completed Honors ePortfolio workbook as part of their honors contract. The Honors ePortfolio is provided from the University Honors & Scholars Center at the beginning of student's first semester at the university.

Honors Contract Exception Petition:

In order to list an "Other, as approved by the Division of Dental Hygiene Undergraduate Honors Committee" experience on your honors contract, you must have the experience pre-approved via a petition, so prior planning must be enacted in order to meet deadlines to maintain honors status. Experiences to complete the honors contract are planned in the first and second years of a student's undergraduate career, so students are not permitted to submit a petition during their final semester of enrollment.

Course Description

2 credits

In-Person: Thursdays 12:30 – 2:25 pm (May 8th – June 26) 9:30 – 11:30 am (July 3rd – July 24th) (Postle Hall – Room 3089A (5/8, 5/15, 5/22 (asynchronous), 5/29, 6/5, 6/12, 6/26, 7/3 (asynchronous), 7/10, 7/17, 7/24, 7/28 Final Exam)

This course will provide the dental hygiene student with an understanding of his/her role in the community as well as the basic principles of community oral health. Additionally, this class will provide the necessary knowledge and skills for the dental hygienist to promote oral health, deliver an effective educational program to community groups as well as interact with fellow professionals and the public in an ethical and responsible manner. The core content of this course includes: the role of the dental hygienist in the prevention and control of oral disease, epidemiological patterns of oral disease, assessment of community needs, approaches to community program development, methods and resources utilized in providing oral health care. The goals of the course director are to share up to date issues that face dental hygienists in the community and discuss programs to address these issues. Through a Community Outreach Project, students will see the applicability of this information in addressing the needs of their chosen population group.

As part of the honors curriculum, students enrolled in this course are expected to complete additional assignments designed to deepen their engagement with the material. Successful completion of these requirements is necessary to fulfill the honors component of the course

Philosophy of Teaching Statement

Learning is a dynamic process that requires both the teacher and students to be engaged and prepared. Courses are more meaningful and enjoyable when we all bring our wealth of background experiences and curiosity to the classroom and work together to find answers to the questions of not only how best to treat each individual patient, but to increase the greater health of the public.

The course director reserves the right to make changes to the syllabus when necessary or beneficial to meet the objectives of the course, compensate for missed classes or schedule changes, or for other legitimate reasons. Students will be notified of any such changes to the syllabus in adequate time to adjust to the changes.

Instructional Objectives

Upon completion of DENTHYG 3210 the student will be able to:

- 1. Define Health and Wellness
- 2. Define the domains of public health and discuss the criteria for identifying a public health problem and ideal solutions
- 3. Differentiate between the various forms of prevention in a community health context
- 4. Identify the core functions of a community health program
- 5. Compare and contrast the dental hygiene process of care on the individual and community level.
- 6. Summarize the role of government agencies in community oral health.
- 7. Analyze the Surgeon General's Report and Healthy People 2030 to assess the oral health care needs of a population and develop strategies to meet those needs
- 8. Define epidemiology and its uses and describe how distribution and frequency of disease within a population is measured
- 9. Analyze the interplay of host, agent, and environment in the oral disease process
- 10. Apply database information to evaluate epidemiological trends at the county, state, and national levels
- 11. Compare and contrast various types of epidemiologic studies and evaluate their application in assessing oral health needs
- 12. Explain the principles of research including data collection methods, sampling techniques, and the components of evidence based practice in public health
- 13. Explore the role that cultural competency in addressing the needs of our patients in a community setting.
- 14. Explore tobacco cessation programs at the community level
- **15.** Recognize the importance of mentorship and create an informational poster to demonstrate the knowledge gained from a literature review
- 16. Conduct interviews and data collection to analyze the oral health needs of a population and develop evidence-based solutions
- 17. Develop a community outreach program by identifying needs, defining goals, and outlining objectives
- 18. Apply evidence based practices to execute a community outreach project, ensuring alignment with program goals and objectives
- 19. Design evaluation tools to measure the outcomes and impact of the community outreach project
- 20. Analyze the various parts of a scholarly article
- 21. Develop a lesson plan to address the defined needs of a target population using age and cultural relevance
- 22. Explore methods of oral health education
- 23. Compare and contrast health education and promotion theories
- 24. Understand the criteria and methodology used in common dental indices to assess oral health.
- 25. Explore the prevention of oral diseases at the community level
- 26. Discuss the mechanisms of payment for dental services in the US
- 27. Explore the future of dental care delivery
- 28. Analyze the various oral health challenges faced by different populations in public health
- 29. Identify key ethical and legal challenges in public health practice
- 30. Discuss how age, race, ethnicity, gender identity, and SES impact how individuals perceive and receive oral health care
- 31. Evaluate the success of a community outreach project

When multiple references occur, follow these guidelines:

- Separate numbers not in a continuous numeric sequences by commas with no spaces
- Continue more than two numbers in a continuous sequence with a hyphen or dash between the first and last numbers
- If there are only two consecutive numbers, separate them with a comma with no spaces

Examples with multiple references:

Modern scientific nomenclature really began with Linnaeus in botany1, but other disciplines 2,3 were not many years behind in developing various systems 4-7 for nomenclature and symbolization. ...have been shown 1,2,5,7,11-15 to abrogate the requirement of T-cells...

This two-credit-hour course will allow dental hygiene students to build upon the process of scientific inquiry, research methodology, basic statistical concepts, and interpretation of data analysis and results This course will focus on learning the skills of evidence-based decision making, critical analysis of research reports, as well as weighing the strength of collective research on oral health topics.

As part of the honors curriculum, students enrolled in this course are expected to complete additional assignments designed to deepen their engagement with the material. Successful completion of these requirements is necessary to fulfill the honors component of the course.



DENTHYG 4430 is a CAPSTONE experience that provides the student with the opportunity to apply the knowledge and skills acquired throughout the dental hygiene curriculum. Attendance

Students are required to be in attendance every day they are assigned and you are expected to participate at your assigned Capstone site(s) for the duration of the semester(s). If you are unable to attend the Capstone course, in addition to notifying Student Affairs of your absence, you MUST also contact your site supervisor (email and/or phone) and course director (Ms. Kissell) prior to the start of your day and schedule a make-up time. The makeup session or assignments will be assigned at the discretion of the course director, as needed.

Attendance is a factor in the final S/U grade. Students may not schedule board exams during assigned Capstone days and may not request more than one excused absence unless an emergency arises. If there is more than one instance where the Capstone student fails to inform the site supervisor of an absence in advance of their assigned time, has more than one absence, or does not complete make-up time for any days missed, an **unsatisfactory** grade in the course will result. Capstone is a separate course from clinic and therefore does not include the option for using personal days or the option for ending patient care before the end of the semester. The College of Dentistry's Student Attendance Operating Procedure indicates that students are expected to attend all scheduled course activities, on time and for the entire session.

When the course director determines that the student is adequately prepared, the student will complete experiences or exams on the content they failed in this course.
