Dear Bernadette:

The Department of English would like to make some minor changes to the major requirements for the Creative Writing specialization.

The reasons for the adjustment are both practical and pedagogical. Last May the English advisors approached me to note a difficulty with the way the degree audit system assigns credit for Create Writing workshops, which are different from Creative Writing classes in that they center the students' own writings rather than the instructor teaching concepts.

Our advisors have found that students are having trouble tracking their progress to graduation because the system has some sort of issue that keeps it from accurately giving credit for requirements when a workshop can count for requirements at different levels, and it's causing real problems for advising. Essentially, the system is struggling to properly handle categories labeled "2000-level or higher" and "3000-level or higher." What's happening is that a student will have taken, say, a 2000-level workshop, 3000-level workshop, and instead of assigning them appropriately, it's doing things like counting the 4000-level workshop in the category of the 2000-level or higher, which it technically could fulfill according to the way the requirements are written, but it obviously isn't meant to do so. And then it doesn't count the 2000-level workshop toward the major at all, even though it's supposed to do so.

The advisors have suggested a tweak that would circumvent the technical issue as well as more accurately represent what we want students to be taking to fulfill their requirements. Our Creative Writing faculty are on board and agree that these changes would be a better way of guiding students through their coursework.

What we propose is to revise the current requirements, which are these:

- Two CW workshops at the 2000-level or higher
- One CW workshop at the 3000-level or higher
- One CW workshop or course at the 3000-level or higher
- Two 4000+-level CW workshops

To these:

- Two CW workshops at the 2000-level
- One CW workshop at the 3000-level
- One CW workshop or class at the 3000-level or higher
- Two 4000-level CW workshops

THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY

The reality is that our Creative Writing faculty don't want students skipping the lower-level workshops because they prepare them for the higher-level ones. This has become particularly important because we decided a few years ago that admission to the higher-level workshops would be automatic rather than competitive. Students still submit portfolios, but we use them as a way for the instructor to assess student needs rather than to deny entrance to some students. This has made the specialization more accessible to a wider range of students, some of whom may not be looking to become creative writers, but who nonetheless want to study it to prepare for careers in publishing.

Our advisors have thus been encouraging students to follow the proposed new version of the specialization, and this would formalize what the faculty really want the students to be taking.

HOW TO GRADUATE WITH RESEARCH DISTINCTION IN ENGLISH

Students planning to pursue *research distinction* in English will complete at least 4 credit hours of English 4999 (4999H for honors students), the course number assigned for work on undergraduate theses, in addition to the 36 hours required for the major. To graduate with research distinction in English, students must meet the following requirements at the time of their graduation: (a) have completed 60 graded hours at Ohio State, (b) have at least a 3.0 cumulative grade point average (*note: the GPA requirement for honors students is 3.4*), and have successfully defended their thesis during an oral examination.
