Dear Professor Krissek:

The CCI's Arts and Humanities 2 subcommittee met on May 25, 2011, and reviewed the semester conversion plans for the BA and minor in Film Studies. These are interdisciplinary programs directed by Prof. John Davidson in Germanic Languages and Literatures. The committee voted unanimously to send both programs on to the full CCI. We did, however, have some changes and clarifications to recommend, should the CCI return these programs for revision.

Film Studies BA

- The added requirement to take a senior seminar (Film Studies 4695 or other approved course) is not really a 0-credit addition, as stated in the "Rationale" section in the description of the major. The information concerning this new 3-hour requirement appears to be correct, however, in later sections of the document.
- The second page of the semester advising sheet has a number of asterisks whose purpose is not clear. A footnote is needed to clarify their meaning.
- On the page titled "Film Studies Major," the required hours for the major are given as 36 but should be 39.
- The curriculum map was given in duplicate (at least on the version the committee reviewed). The second version appears to be the correct (non-scanned) one. Removing the last two columns, which are empty, would improve appearances.

Film Studies Minor

- The program goals on the PACER form should be deleted.
- On the semester advising sheet in the paragraph under pictures, the sentence, "(This excludes the course used as the introductory course.)" should be removed, since there are no 4000-level courses among the introductory courses.
- The quarter advising sheet from the ASC website should be included.
- As for the BA, the curriculum map appears (or appeared) in duplicate.

- The curriculum map does not contain all the courses listed for the minor. German 3351 is missing from the list of Introductory Courses. Also missing are Film Studies 2770, 3640, 4194, History of Art 2901, 3901, 4901, Italian 2053, and WGS Studies 3317.
- The curriculum map also contains courses not listed for the minor, including Film Studies 2367.01, 2367.02, 4680, 4690, 4695, History of Art 2350, and Slavic 3360.
- Both of the above problems could be resolved by removing the curriculum map, which is not needed for a minor, but even if this is the course taken, the discrepancies in course listings should be checked.

The Faculty Steering Committee has completed and submitted its proposal for a semester version of its interdisciplinary major: BA in Film Studies. The program was reviewed and unanimously approved by the Arts and Humanities Disciplinary Advisory Panel for Curriculum within the College of Arts and Sciences on May 11, 2011. Previously this minor was housed in ASC Interdisciplinary Programs Office, and with the re-structuring in Arts and Sciences has moved to be administratively housed in the Division of Arts and Humanities in the College of Arts and Sciences, with the Director of Film Studies directly reporting to the Divisional Dean. Please note that since this program crosses multiple units, the first line only on the PACER chart has been completed. Film Studies has an Assessment Plan on file, confirmed with OAA on October 15, 2010.

Most specifically, I have highlighted the changes for the program below:

BA in Film Studies: The BA in Film Studies was last revised and approved by CAA previous to 2006 as there are no ASC or CAA electronic records that indicate approval or revision after 2006. The BA is changing with minimal conversion. The program converted from 55 quarter credit hour, to 39 semester credit hours with one 3 credit hour pre-requisite. They have retained the same pre-requisite course, English 2264 (263), the same two core courses History of Art 2901 (260) and Film Studies 2271 (260), and the same categories. They have refined the requirements for the BA by formalizing a writing experience for their majors under the newly required Senior Seminar, and have added a Non-Fictional/Non-Industrial category requirement in place of two open Electives.

Minor in Film Studies: The Minor in Film Studies was last revised and approved by CAA previous to 2006 as there are no ASC or CAA electronic records of approval. The minor is changing with minimal conversion. There were five courses required on the quarter version for a total of 25 credit hours, and there are five courses required on the semester version for a total of 15 credit hours. The choice from among the five core courses is changed by one: English 2263 (263), German 3351 (299), History of Art 2901 (260) Women's Studies 3317 (317), and English 373 is replaced with Film Studies 2270 *Introduction to Film Studies*. The requirement of four additional courses beyond the core choice remains the same, with two of the courses at the 4000-level or above, thus fulfilling the ASC requirement of 6 credit hours at the 3000-level or above.

We are sending these undergraduate programs forward for review and approval in the next stage of curricular review at the Arts and Sciences Committee on Curriculum and Instruction. The courses that are specific to all of the programs are listed under multiple Book 3 Listings. The Film Studies Program (FS) is pleased to present the following revisions and suggested implementation for conversion to the semester calendar of its degrees. FS is currently housed within the Division of Arts and Humanities in the College of Arts and Sciences. FS administers three degrees:

1. Undergraduate Major in Film Studies – Converted with minimal changes
2. Undergraduate Minor in Film Studies – Converted with no changes
3. Graduate Interdisciplinary Specialization in Film Studies – Converted with no changes

FS came into existence in late 2005 and the major went on the books in early 2006. Since that time we have made small adjustments, but semester conversion gives us a welcome opportunity to reassess our degree programs. The conversion task was handled from the program director's office, with input from the Interdisciplinary Film Studies Committee (IFSC), the body of faculty that does the bulk of the teaching of film studies courses. In order to streamline the process, we focused on the following general principles to help us mitigate the difficulties that come with being an interdisciplinary program spread across about ten different units: curricular coherence and progression of students through coursework from lower to upper levels; inclusion of important but little taught aspects of film studies, such as experimental and documentary cinema; commitment to our six learning goals, with particular attention to the need for students to improve their writing (#6). Changes to the major were discussed during several meetings of the IFSC throughout 2010 and accepted by the voting members, consisting of the IFSC faculty, at the end of autumn quarter 2010. They have been communicated to the Film Studies Steering Committee. No changes to the structure of the minor or GIS were deemed useful at this time.

As director of the program, I can attest to the rigor with which these programmatic changes were undertaken and approve all of the proposed changes to our undergraduate major. All of the degree programs outlined above will continue after conversion to semesters has taken place. No programs are being withdrawn.

FILM STUDIES UNDERGRADUATE PROGRAM RATIONALE

Program Goals

The overarching goals of the Undergraduate Program in Film Studies at the Ohio State University are (A) to steep students in the rich history of moving pictures as artistic forms and social practices and, thus, (B) to help students develop essential competencies that prepare them to succeed as global citizens in a world that is increasingly kinetic and visual. Students acquire a depth and breadth of knowledge about the history, traditions, and theory of cinema from around the world and refine their analytical and critical thinking skills. Through this, and by guiding their pursuit of a concentrated focus area arising from their special interests, we prepare students to engage with an increasingly diverse, fast-changing world images for a rich life of continued learning.

FILM STUDIES UNDERGRADUATE MAJOR PROGRAM

Specific Learning Goals

1. Students acquire the tools for rigorous formal and historical analysis of film
2. Students learn to think critically about film as an aesthetic form and cinema as a social institution
3. Students pursue interdisciplinary inquiries about cinema
4. Students gain in-depth knowledge in one area
5. Students learn to synthesize general conclusions from their specific analyses that go beyond individual examples
6. Students improve their writing skills

Rationale for Changes from Quarters to Semesters

The undergraduate major in film studies is undergoing a slight revision as we move from quarters to semesters, which in essence involves 3 changes: [1] an added requirement to complete two courses within a new “Non-Industrial / Non-fictional” component of the major; [2] an added (3 CH) requirement that students complete at least one course designated a senior seminar; [3] the reduction of film studies electives from four courses to three courses. The grounds for these adjustments are as follows:

1. Film Studies is committed to engaging students with the broadest range of moving image history and forms possible in order to expose them to full spectrum of traditions and to encourage them to challenge the boundaries of what is familiar and comfortable. Artistic, experimental, avant garde, and documentary practices are among the richest that film has to offer, and yet in the major under the quarter system there was no requirement that students grapple with them. The new “Non-Industrial / Non-fictional” component asks students to complete a three-credit-hour course approved

for each of these designations, for a total of six credit hours within the re-envisioned major.

2. The new senior seminar component serves two purposes. First, it ensures that our students, the bulk of whose classes may have large enrollments, will take at least one course in a more intimate and intensive intellectual atmosphere. Second, Film Studies firmly believes that the ability to write well in a variety of settings is among the most valuable skills a college graduate can possess. While many of the courses incorporated into the major stress writing in some form, their size often discourages instructors from assigning longer, research-oriented papers or similar projects. This component ensures that our students complete such work in an intimate, intense setting in at least one class, such as FS 4695, "Senior Seminar in Film Studies." This is a three-credit-hour requirement.
3. The film studies major under quarters comprises 11 courses = 55 credit hours. The addition of the Non-Industrial / Non-Fictional and senior seminar components at semester conversion adds three courses to that total, bringing it to 14 courses = 42 credit hours. To remain within the 55 :: 39 ratio suggested for semester conversion, we reduced the number of electives needed from 4 (20 quarter hours) to 3 (9 semester hours), so that the film studies major at semesters comprises 13 courses = 39 hours.

These changes were worked out, vetted, and approved by the Interdisciplinary Film Studies Committee (IFSC), the body comprising the faculty who teach the courses in the major, and communicated to the Film Studies Steering Committee, which oversees the program.

Program Structure – Film Studies Major

Students majoring in Film Studies are required to complete 39 credits across these categories:

Pre-Requisite (3 units, not included in the major total)

Core Requirements (6 units)

Non-Industrial / Non-fictional Component (6 units)

Multicultural Component (3 units)

Pre-1950s Component (3 units)

Focus Area (9 units)

Electives (9 units, of which at least 6 must be at 4000-level or above)

Senior Seminar (3 units)

FILM STUDIES Major (130)

Incorporating other fields such as art, history, languages, popular culture, and communications, film studies offers the student extensive possibilities for experience and knowledge. Film studies majors learn to analyze, synthesize and discern important information—they learn to read and write effectively and look at the world with a critical eye, but most importantly, the film studies major develops a critical and audio-visual literacy. In a culture that increasingly relies on visual information, a comprehension of how meaning grows out of the moving image becomes essential to various areas of society.

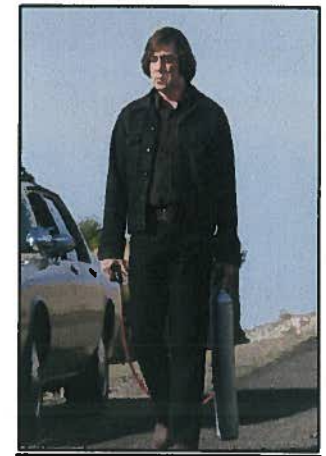
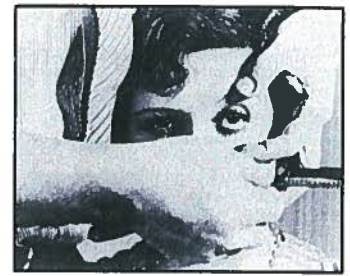
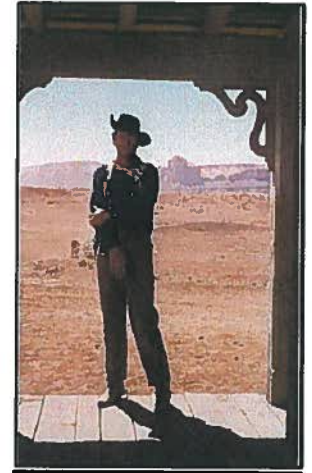

Students will be asked to work out a clear plan of study with their major advisor. Film Studies, in turn, will maintain flexibility in working with students to devise a meaningful and feasible plan of study.

The following guidelines will be used in advising students during the transition to semesters.

- Students declaring a major autumn 2010-spring 2011 must follow the guidelines of the old major.
- Students declaring a major in autumn 2011 can still choose old major or new major. Beginning summer 2012 they will pick and choose from new semester major courses. Additional transition courses are not needed.
- Beginning winter 2012, students will be advised according to new major sheet. Courses taken before summer 2012 will be converted to equivalent semester courses.

Sample Major Program Scenarios

1 - Student A declared a Film Studies major AU 2010 and will complete the old major requirements. Coming into summer 2012 she has completed English 263, History of Art 260, and Film Studies 270 (=15 quarter credits) the equivalent of 9 semester units, of which 3 are pre-requisite and 6 are in the major. Under the old requirements she would need 9 additional courses in order to fulfill the total 55 credits needed. In semesters she will still be required to complete 9 additional courses. These 9 courses will be selected to meet the old major guidelines using transitioned and newly offered courses that fulfill the same requirements (1 Pre 1950's, 1 Multicultural, 4 Electives, and 3 Focus Area courses). 3 of the 4 electives must be at the 4xxx level which coincides with the old requirements of being above the 400 level.

2 - Student B declares a Film Studies major AU 2011, and chooses whether to work with the old or new major requirements; he takes English 263 and History of Art 260 in 2011/12, the equivalent of 6 units, of which 3 are pre-requisite and 3 are in the major. The two previously taken courses will be transitioned to their semester equivalents.

- Under the old system he would require 10 courses: FS 2271, 1 Pre-1950's course, 1 Multicultural course, 4 Electives, and 3 Focus Area courses. 3 of the 4 electives must be at or above the 4000 level which coincides with the old requirements of being at or above the 400 level.
- Under the new system he would require 12 courses: FS 2271, 2 Non-Fictional/-Industrial courses, 1 Pre-1950's course, 1 Multicultural course, 3 Electives, 3 Focus Area courses, and 1 course designated as a "senior seminar." 2 of the 3 electives must be at or above the 4000 level, which coincides with the old requirements of being must be at or above the 400 level.

3 - Student C declares a Film Studies major in SP 12; she has already completed English 263, History of Art 260, Film Studies 270, Russian 360, and History of Art 647, the equivalent of 15 units of which 3 are pre-requisite and 12 are in the major. The 5 previously taken courses will be transitioned to their semester equivalents, and she will be advised according to the new major guidelines. Student C will still need to complete 9 courses: 2 Non-Fictional/-Industrial courses, 3 Electives, 3 Focus Area courses, and 1 course designated as a "senior seminar." 2 of the 3 electives must be at or above the 4000 level, which coincides with the old requirements of being must be at or above the 400 level.
