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Dear Office of Academic Affairs,

We are putting forward for your consideration the Semester Program Plans for the College of Social Work's BSSW, MSW, and Ph.D. Programs. We used the transition to semesters as an opportunity to redesign our undergraduate and graduate programs to better reflect the changing nature of the social work profession, to respond to community and student requests, and to emphasize areas of faculty research and expertise. Reactions to the proposed changes from faculty, staff, students and the community have been very positive.

The curricular changes for the BSSW and MSW degree programs were based on a series of activities designed to solicit ideas from key stakeholders in social work. In October 2009 we hosted a day-long forum to discuss the curriculum that included over 90 faculty, staff, students, graduates, and community practitioners. In 2009-2010 we asked faculty, staff and community practitioners to describe their ideal social work program. Several hundred ideas were generated that were then combined through a "concept mapping" process. These concepts and the information from the forum were used to guide the redesign of the BSSW and MSW programs. As a result, the new programs are far more flexible, student friendly, responsive to community needs, compliant with the profession's new accrediting standards, and consistent with faculty research and expertise. The proposed changes were approved to both programs were approved by the faculty in the Spring quarter of 2010.

Similarly, changes to the Ph.D. Program curriculum were guided by 1) numerous discussions attended by faculty, students, and graduates, 2) a day-long retreat on the future of doctoral education lead by a key social work researcher from the University of Washington, and 3) new developments in social work research that require doctoral graduates to be familiar with translational research methods. We expect that the curricular changes will better prepare graduates with the skills and competencies required for future faculty and research positions. The curricular plans for the doctoral program were approved by faculty at the January 2011 faculty meeting.

We are very pleased with the curricula that have been developed and look forward to any feedback or comments that you might have to guide our future work. Please feel free to contact me or Denise Bronson (Associate Dean for Academic Affairs) if you have any questions or concerns.

Bachelor of Science in Social Work Program Proposal

Program Rationale:

The College of Social Work viewed the semester conversion as an opportunity to re-envision and re-package the Bachelor of Science in Social Work Program. The proposed semester curriculum is built around the accreditation standards established by the Council on Social Work Education (CSWE). CSWE has identified forty-one practice behaviors that operationalize ten core competencies considered critical for professional social work practice, and our curricular goal is to facilitate student attainment of these competencies and practice behaviors and enhance student employment opportunities for the current and projected job market.

Our assessment data and input from faculty, staff, students, and community agencies assisted us in identifying current curricular strengths as well as those competencies and practice behaviors that required enhanced emphasis within the new curriculum. In some cases, new courses were created to address areas of limitation, and in other cases, content was re-structured in a manner that assures more in-depth examination of topic areas. Increased importance was placed on application of knowledge, and thus the semester curriculum is more experiential in nature, with enhanced opportunity to systematically rehearse and master generalist practice skills. The curriculum is also conceptualized in a way that courses build on each other, content in one course is reinforced in multiple courses, and the relationship between content areas is identified and emphasized. While a particular course may assume primary responsibility for providing instruction related to a specific competency and the associated practice behaviors, competencies and practice behaviors are introduced and reinforced in multiple areas of the curriculum. Key changes are summarized below:

Professional Values & Ethics:

The quarter-based curriculum does not require a primary course on professional values and ethics, instead only offering an elective that addresses this content. This elective (*SWK 690*) was amended and enhanced for the semester curriculum and is now a required course (*SWK 3101*) taught during students' first semester in the major. This course will ground students in the core values of the profession and facilitate understanding of social work ethics as embodied by the National Association of Social Workers Code of Ethics.

Cultural Competence:

A new course, *Social Work Practice with Diverse Populations (SWK 3503)*, was created to enhance students' abilities to engage diversity and difference in practice. Social workers are increasingly confronted with a more diverse population of clients due to major demographic shifts and the needs of immigrants/refugees. Effective social work practice requires the use of appropriate methodological approaches, skills, and techniques that reflect the workers' understanding of the role of culture in the helping process, and this course will allow for in-depth examination in this area.

Restructuring of Practice Courses:

The quarter-based curriculum consists of a sequence of three practice courses, which does not allow for a sufficient experiential component. The semester curriculum contains five distinct practice courses and thus allows for both didactic instruction and systematic practice of engagement, assessment, intervention, and evaluation skills with individuals, families, groups, and larger systems.

Students complete a new course, *Engagement & Interviewing Skills (SWK 3501)*, during their initial semester in the program, focusing on the development of communication skills critical to social work and allowing time for consistent video-taping and critique. *Foundations of Generalist Practice (SWK 3502)*, offered during the second semester, is an enhanced version of the current *SWK 645 Practice I* course, and introduces students to theories, knowledge and skills of generalist social work practice, with an emphasis on work with individuals. In addition, considerable content on case management was added to this course as mastery of case management skills has routinely been identified as an area of limitation in the current curriculum. The quarter-based *SWK 646 Practice II* course, which introduces students to practice with families and groups, was divided into two courses, *Generalist Practice with Families (SWK 4501)* and *Generalist Practice with Groups (SWK 4502)*, as faculty and students have consistently indicated there is simply not sufficient time in the quarter course to develop competency in each practice area. The final practice course, *(SWK 4503)*, focusing on practice with communities and organizations, is an enhanced equivalent of *SWK 647 Practice III*.

Research:

The 3-quarter research sequence (*SWK 571, 570, & 576*) was modified and re-envisioned into a 2-semester sequence (*SWK 3401 & 3402*) focusing on the role of research in social work practice, methods of research design and implementation, and how evidence is used to guide practice at all intervention levels.

Human Behavior and the Social Environment:

The 2-quarter *Human Behavior and the Social Environment* sequence (*SWK 533 & 534*) was developed into a one-semester course, *SWK 3301 Lifespan Development*, which will examine human development processes across the lifespan in order to understand human behavior.

Social Policy/Social Justice:

The quarter-based *SWK 521 Problems, Policies, and Programs in Social Welfare* course was significantly modified and the semester version includes not only content on social policy, but also content on advocacy and strategies to address social injustice (*SWK 3201 Social & Economic Justice*).

Field Placement:

The structure of field placement has not altered with the conversion to semesters. Students will complete 420 total hours in a social service agency during Autumn and Spring Semester of their senior year, concurrent with their advanced practice courses and the support of a bi-weekly field seminar.

Social Work Electives:

Required major course credit hours were increased in order to enhance delivery of foundation knowledge and add an increased experiential component, and thus there is a decrease in the social work elective credit hours. Students will complete 14 semester credit hours (as opposed to 32 quarter credit hours - a decrease of 7 semester credit hours). The completion of, at minimum, 5 elective courses, will still allow students sufficient opportunity to enhance their required foundation courses with specialized study.

GE Courses:

The College's general education requirements remain largely unchanged. Content from *SWK 570*, our quarter-based Data Analysis GEC, was divided between the 2-semester research course sequence of *SWK 3401 & 3402*, and thus the College is requesting that this sequence be considered as the Data Analysis GEC. All social work major students are required to complete this sequence.

Transition policy statements:

In planning and implementing its conversion from quarters to semesters, The Bachelor of Science in Social Work program is committed to protecting the academic progress of its students. Students will find that the change from quarters to semesters does not disrupt advancement toward their degrees if they meet the standards for progress defined by our program; continue to complete required course loads successfully; and follow the transitional advising plans developed with their academic advisors.

We do not foresee any significant issues arising during the transition due to the sequential nature of our degree program and there was no identified need for bridge courses. The majority of students complete the social work major courses and social work electives during their junior and senior years, entering the major with the majority of, if not all, GE course requirements completed. The content, core competencies and associated practice behaviors currently taught in the junior year are contained in the junior year of the semester curriculum. And as in the quarter system, the semester-based senior year continues to contain advanced practice courses, field placement, and social work electives. Students completing their junior year on the quarter system will thus move easily into the semester based senior year. Students entering the major on the quarter system as sophomores will also have a smooth transition into their semester-based junior year. This group of students will complete their SW 521 policy course and SWK 533 & 534 HBSE sequence during this initial year in the major, and thus be waived from the semester equivalent courses (SWK 3201 & SWK 3301) during their junior year.

Students who have declared the social work major within the three years prior to the shift to semesters will finish their degree under the “old” GE course requirements in order to maintain a consistent approach to transition planning.

While our program is lock-step and students in a given cohort all register for the same courses, all students will meet individually with an academic advisor to develop transition plans in order to ensure that any curricular anomalies are identified and that students understand the ramifications of dropping courses or taking a leave of absence.

College policy dictates that students who earn less than a C in a required social work major course must repeat the course, thus students who earn less than a C in a quarter-based course will be required to repeat the semester equivalent of this course. As the HBSE and research sequences were merged from 2 – 1 course sequence and a 3 – 2 course sequence, respectively, cases including these courses may result in the repetition of some coursework.
