Dear Office of Academic Affairs,

We are putting forward for your consideration the Semester Program Plans for the College of Social Work's BSSW, MSW, and Ph.D. Programs. We used the transition to semesters as an opportunity to redesign our undergraduate and graduate programs to better reflect the changing nature of the social work profession, to respond to community and student requests, and to emphasize areas of faculty research and expertise. Reactions to the proposed changes from faculty, staff, students and the community have been very positive.

The curricular changes for the BSSW and MSW degree programs were based on a series of activities designed to solicit ideas from key stakeholders in social work. In October 2009 we hosted a day-long forum to discuss the curriculum that included over 90 faculty, staff, students, graduates, and community practitioners. In 2009-2010 we asked faculty, staff and community practitioners to describe their ideal social work program. Several hundred ideas were generated that were then combined through a "concept mapping" process. These concepts and the information from the forum were used to guide the redesign of the BSSW and MSW programs. As a result, the new programs are far more flexible, student friendly, responsive to community needs, compliant with the profession's new accrediting standards, and consistent with faculty research and expertise. The proposed changes were approved to both programs were approved by the faculty in the Spring quarter of 2010.

Similarly, changes to the Ph.D. Program curriculum were guided by 1) numerous discussions attended by faculty, students, and graduates, 2) a day-long retreat on the future of doctoral education lead by a key social work researcher from the University of Washington, and 3) new developments in social work research that require doctoral graduates to be familiar with translational research methods. We expect that the curricular changes will better prepare graduates with the skills and competencies required for future faculty and research positions. The curricular plans for the doctoral program were approved by faculty at the January 2011 faculty meeting.

We are very pleased with the curricula that have been developed and look forward to any feedback or comments that you might have to guide our future work. Please feel free to contact me or Denise Bronson (Associate Dean for Academic Affairs) if you have any questions or concerns.

*MSW Semester Curriculum Rationale*

The MSW program is a two-year (full-time study) graduate curriculum leading to the Master of Social Work degree. Students who successfully complete the program acquire the competencies and practice behaviors that are required by Council on Social Work Education (the accrediting body for all social work programs) and are prepared to successfully pass the state licensing examination. In addition to offering a program for two-year full-time study, the College also offers a) three and four-year part-time programs, b) full and part-time advanced standing programs (ASAP) for those who graduated from accredited undergraduate social work programs and meet admission criteria, and c) part-time programs that allow students to begin the MSW program on the regional campuses.

Ten competencies are required by the Council on Social Work Education (CSWE) for graduates of all social work programs. Beginning mastery of these competencies is expected for MSW I students, and advanced mastery is required for MSW II students. The areas of expected competence are:

1. Identify as a professional social worker and conduct oneself accordingly;
2. Apply social work ethical principles to guide professional judgments;
3. Apply critical thinking to inform and communicate professional judgments;
4. Engage diversity and difference in practice;
5. Advance human rights and social and economic justice;
6. Engage in research-informed practice and practice-informed research;
7. Apply knowledge of human behavior and the social environment;
8. Engage in policy practice to advance social and economic well-being and to deliver effective social work services;
9. Respond to contexts that shape practice; and
10. Engage, assess, intervene, and evaluate with individuals, families, groups, organizations, and communities.

The MSW program was redesigned for the transition to semesters. Using extensive input from faculty, staff, students, graduates, and community social work practitioners the guiding framework for the curriculum was designed to:

- Be more student focused by allowing more choices and the opportunity for each student to structure their educational experience for the settings in which they plan to work;
- Have more flexibility in the scheduling of classes;
- Build upon faculty research and expertise;
- Enhance student employment opportunities for the current and projected job market; and
- Reflect advances in social work evidence-based practices.

There are six types of courses that provide the framework for the redesigned MSW curriculum (See Figure 1). The courses provide both foundation and advanced competency in the ten Council on Social Work Education mandated competency areas. Students in the MSW program (either full or part-time) will be required to take 63 semester credit hours to graduate. Advanced Standing Alternative Program (ASAP) students will be required to complete 43 semester credit hours of study.

1. Foundation Courses	These courses are offered during the first semester of the program and are designed to address the core competencies and practice behaviors that are essential for all social workers.
2. Practice Area Specialization Courses	The integrated seminars focus on specialized systems of practice to provide depth of knowledge about services targeted at a specific practice arena. The integrated seminars are intended to develop competence and advanced practice behaviors that are needed for successful social work practice in an identified social service system. This includes specialized knowledge of the <i>policies, theories, issues, services, best practices, and desired outcomes</i> within each social service system.
3. Advanced Practice Methods Courses	The advanced practice methods courses help students acquire the practice behaviors needed for successful social work practice at the micro- and macro-levels. These courses are intended to teach students “how to do it” regardless of the service system in which they are working.
4. Engaging with Evidence: Practice or Program Evaluation	Building upon a foundation course that introduces engaging with evidence, students will complete two courses in either practice or program evaluation. The first course in the sequence will introduce the knowledge and skill required to complete practice or program evaluations and the second course will give students the opportunity to conduct practice or program evaluation projects.
5. Field Practicum & Field Seminars	Students are required to complete 1008 hours (720 hours for ASAP students) in an approved field placement to graduate with an MSW. The foundation field practicum provides a generalist introduction to social work practice and the advanced field practicum allows students to develop specific skills and knowledge in a particular practice area. The advanced placement will coincide with the student’s primary practice area specialization. The field practicum is supported by the field seminars that are designed to address specific field related issues and to better prepare students to benefit from the field practicum.
6. Electives	<p>Designed to supplement the specialization and advanced practice courses. Electives might include courses on specific populations (GLBT youth), service systems (child welfare, school social work, criminal justice), or practice problems (immigration, social justice, domestic violence &amp; human trafficking). Also included here would be the study abroad programs.</p> <p>a. ### **2. Practice Area Specializations**

Practice Area Specializations represent a broadly defined service system in which social workers are often employed. A service system is characterized by:

- An identified network of agencies that provide targeted services;
- Policies and laws that pertain to that arena of services;
- Specialized diagnostic, intervention, prevention, and outcome evaluation methods;
- Theories that guide practice at the micro and macro levels; and
- Clear parameters for identifying those likely to need and benefit from the services.

The practice area specializations that will be offered by the College of Social Work are based on the following factors:

1. Faculty expertise & teaching preferences
2. The current and projected job market for our graduates
3. Information obtained from an on-line survey & a concept mapping exercise completed by community practitioners, graduates, and faculty
4. Information obtained from the student focus groups
5. The curriculum principles adopted by the College
6. Available resources (Number & size of classes, classroom space, etc.)

Using these criteria, four practice area specializations have been identified:

- Aging & Health
- Mental Health & Substance Abuse
- Child & Youth Services
- Community & Social Justice

Students must complete the two required integrative seminars for at least one of the practice area specializations. The courses for the specializations are:

### **3. Advanced Practice Methods**

The advanced practice methods courses focus on *skills building and practice behaviors*. These courses are intended to give students the ability “to do” various interventions and practice behaviors. Students will be required to complete four advanced practice methods courses. They may choose any combination of methods courses from the list of micro and macro level courses but will be required to take at least one of each. Students may also take additional (more than four) advanced practice methods courses as electives.

**4. Engaging with Evidence: Practice or Program Evaluation**

The *advanced* courses in the Engaging with Evidence sequence focus on the competencies and practice behaviors required to conduct practice or program evaluation. Students will complete two courses. The first provides the knowledge and skills required to complete an evaluation and the second, which serves as the capstone experience for the MSW program, requires students to design, implement, and report on a practice or program evaluation completed in their field practicum settings.

**6. Electives**

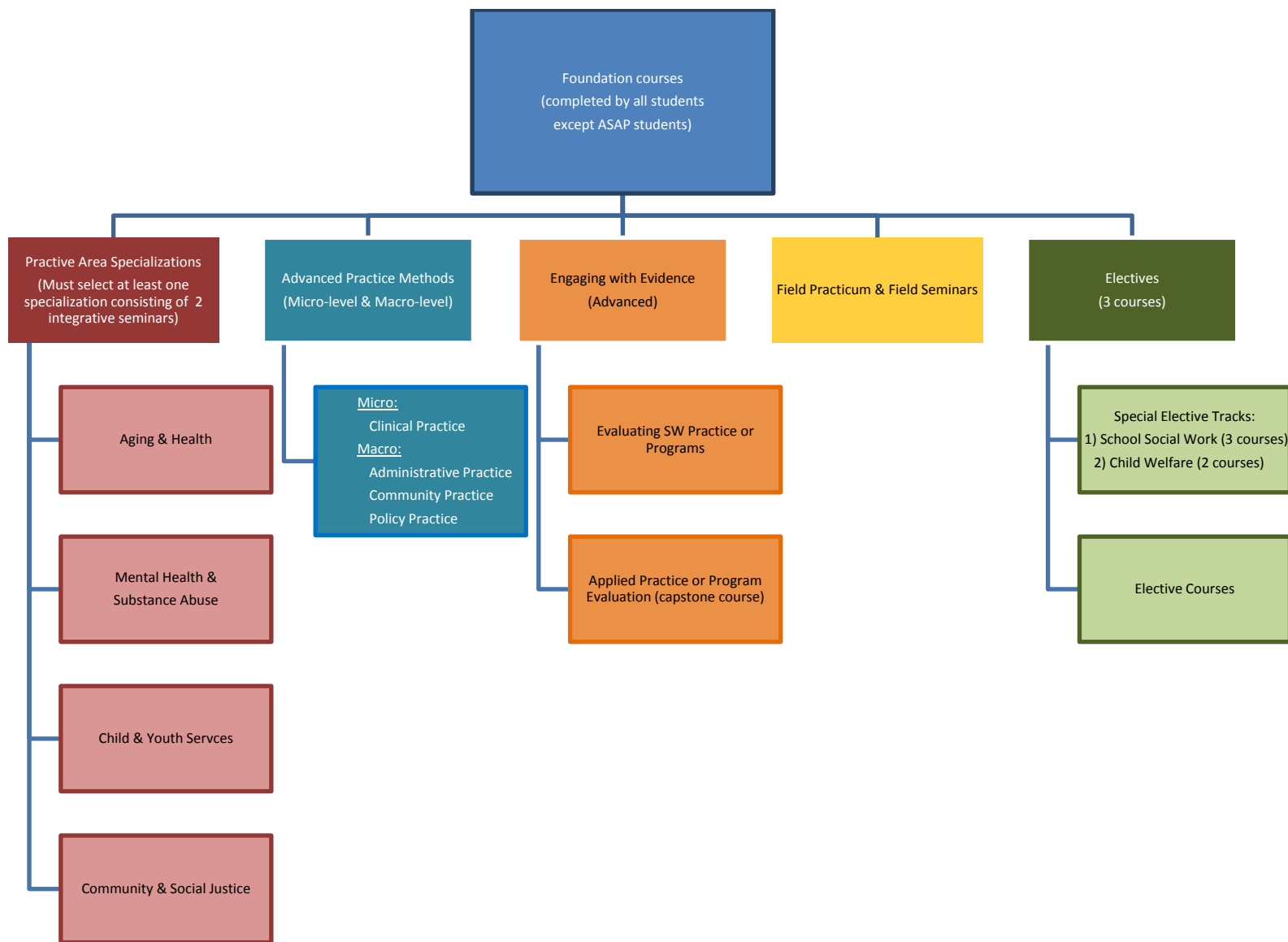

Although these plans will meet the needs of most students, it is possible that more individualized plans will be required for those who depart from the traditional program of study. In those cases, the same methods will be applied to identify the competencies which the student has already mastered and to complete their educational plans so that they are able to master the remaining competencies and avoid unnecessary redundancies.
