Rationale

The department's Graduate Committee met throughout winter 09 and Spring '10 to examine our graduate program. Very early on in the process the Committee decided not to make any major changes in our M.A. program. Instead the Committee decided to make a literal translation from our quarter based program to a semester based program retaining the three areas of concentration: African American Studies, African Studies, and Comparative Diaspora Studies. This did entail reducing the overall number of courses by eliminating some which were no longer relevant to the program and by combining some two quarter sequence courses into one semester courses.

There were two predominate factors in our decision not to make major changes at this time while streamlining and updating the program. First, the department will be going through a program review in 2010-2011 and wanted the perspective of the program reviewers before launching any major changes. And second, the Department has voted to start work on creating a Ph.D. program, once the review and the conversion complete. The last major revision to our M.A. Program was in 2003-2004 when the program was converted from a one year program to a two-year program.

There is no language requirement for the graduate minor program.

GRADUATE MINOR IN AFRICAN AMERICAN AND AFRICAN STUDIES

The Graduate Minor in African American and African Studies is intended to cater to graduate students in a wide range of disciplines who have some interest in the Black experience in Africa and/or the Americas as part of their academic or professional plans and development. Students from various disciplinary backgrounds, such as those in Public Health, Clinical or Counseling Psychology, Education, History, Political Science or Law, stand to benefit immensely from a Graduate Minor in African American Studies, African Studies, and Comparative Diaspora Studies.

There is no language requirement for the graduate minor program.

The Program

1. The Graduate Minor in African American, Comparative Diaspora and African Studies requires a minimum of **20 credit hours** of coursework in these three areas. None of these hours may be in AAAS 693 without the written approval of the Director of Graduate Studies in the Department of African American and African Studies.
2. The Graduate Minor in African American and African Studies has THREE concentrations:

In the planning and implementing of its conversion from quarters to semesters for summer 2012, The Ohio State University and its Department of African American and African Studies (AAAS) are committed to protecting the academic progress of students. You should find that the shift from quarters to semesters does not disrupt progress toward your degrees if you

1. Proactively develop and follow an academic plan in consultation with your Faculty advisor.
2. Fulfill the Core Requirements as laid out in the Graduate Studies Program Handbook
3. Select a focus area and fulfill the course requirements as outlined in the Graduate Studies Program Handbook

Students completing a quarter-plus-semester degree program will receive approximately the same amount of instruction, and the changes to the calendar and to courses will not affect the quality of the AAAS Graduate Program. Tuition (general and instructional fees) for a year under the semester system will not cost any more than tuition under the quarter system, and the change should not adversely affect your financial aid.

To ensure that the conversion will not harm your progress, The AAAS Graduate Studies Committee and your faculty advisor will continue to provide detailed guidance concerning of what you will need to receive the M.A and Graduate Minor. Your Faculty advisor will understand how the changes in courses and curricula may affect students' programs, will know where and how programs can be flexible, and will be prepared to assist you in planning your remaining semesters toward graduation. Good planning around your academic program will be particularly important, and the Graduate Studies Committee and your faculty advisor will provide that support to students who begin their academic career under quarters and complete it under semesters.

Students' records will vary considerably, and each student's plan will need to be determined individually. Every student will be responsible for getting and using the advice essential to assure progress toward his or her degree. Advising is a joint endeavor, and we are confident that students and their advisors, working together, can develop effective plans leading to timely graduation within the context of converting to semesters.

The Department of African American and African Studies has completed and submitted its proposals for the semester versions of its graduate programs:

Graduate Minor in AAAS

MA in AAAS

Ph.D. in AAAS—new program under semesters

The Arts and Humanities Disciplinary Advisory Panel for Curriculum within the College of Arts and Sciences reviewed the proposals on February 25, 2011, provided feedback to the department, and unanimously approved the programs during its meeting on May 11, 2011. We are now forwarding them for review at the Graduate School and Council on Academic Affairs.

Most specifically, I have highlighted the important changes and aspects for the programs below:

Graduate Minor in African American and African Studies: The graduate minor was first approved previous to 2006 as there are no ASC records to indicate otherwise. After discussion and preparation for its program review in 2010-2011, the department chose to convert the graduate minor with some changes, and has retained its quarter concentrations: African American Studies, African Studies, and Comparative Diaspora Studies. The quarter-based degree was 20 credit hours and its semester-based version is 12 credit hours. The core course of 7756 (756) is retained under semesters with the addition of two courses to the core: 7753 and 7754. The inclusion of these three courses as the foundation mirror the MA and PhD core course requirements and provide a solid foundation of understanding for their students. In order to complete the minor, students then select one course from a list of electives. The transition statement that the department has submitted is addressed to the graduate students, and courses counted under quarters will be counted under semesters. As indicated in their transition plan, faculty will work individually with each student to provide the individual advising necessary to complete the Graduate Minor.

Master of Arts in African American and African Studies: The MA in African American and African Studies was first approved previous to 2006 as there are no ASC records to indicate otherwise. Revisions to the program were approved by CAA in academic year 2003-2004 when the one-year program at that time converted to a two-year MA. After discussion and preparation for its program review in 2010-2011, the department chose to convert the MA with minimal changes, and has retained its quarter core courses: 7753, (753), 7754 (754), and 7756 (756). The same quarter requirements of 9 hours of the core courses, 18 hours in the focus area, and 3 hours in the breadth area are required under semesters. Students select from one of three areas of concentration: African American Studies, African Studies or Comparative African Diaspora Studies. Each concentration of African American Studies and African Studies are comprised of two focus areas. Diaspora Studies concentration area is comprised of only a list of courses without a focus area as this area is still growing. The MA also retains its two options: Thesis Plan with 30 credits of course work, 6 hours of thesis, and an oral exam, and a Non-Thesis Plan with 36 credits of course work, a comprehensive written examination, and an oral defense. Like the Graduate Minor, the transition statement that the department has submitted is addressed to the graduate students, and courses

counted under quarters will be counted under semesters. As indicated in their transition plan, faculty will work individually with each student to provide the individual advising necessary to complete the Graduate Minor.

PhD in African American and African Studies: The PhD in African American and African Studies is a *new* program created by the department from its discussions for preparation for its program review. The Graduate Studies Committee and full faculty worked throughout the Winter and Spring to create the new PhD. The college review committee provided feedback throughout this process, and ultimately approved the new graduate degree on May 11, 1011. For students entering with a BA, the program is made up of the MA of 36 hours, the PhD coursework of 36 hours, and 15 hours of dissertation and prospectus, for a total of 87 hours for the PhD. Students not completing their MA from Ohio State, but who instead, enter with 30 credit hours of MA credit from outside the institution, are required to take the three foundational courses of 7753, (753), 7754 (754), and 7756 (756), and then continue with the 36 hours of PhD coursework and 15 hours of dissertation and prospectus, for a total of 90 hours for the PhD. Like the Graduate Minor and MA, students select from one of three areas of concentration: African American Studies, African Studies, or Comparative African Diaspora Studies. Each concentration of African American Studies and African Studies are comprised of two focus areas. Diaspora Studies concentration area is comprised of only a list of courses without a focus area, because this area is still growing. The college is excited to see the development of the doctoral program and fully supports this new Ph.D. Please note that there is a letter of support from Executive Dean and Vice Provost Joseph Steinmetz among the proposal.

We are sending these programs forward for review and approval in the next stage of curricular review at The Graduate School and Council of Academic Affairs. The courses that are specific to the program are listed under AAAS in PACER, and have been advanced along with the program form. All programs from AAAS have the approval of Arts and Humanities. Chair's Letter/Introduction/Rationale


The department's Graduate Studies Committee met throughout the latter half of winter and all of spring 2010 and determined that despite significant changes planned for the undergraduate program, the MA program and the graduate minor should be converted to semesters without changes. Instead the Committee decided to make a literal translation from our quarter based program to a semester based program retaining **the three areas of concentration: African American Studies, African Studies, and Comparative Diaspora Studies**. This did entail reducing the overall number of courses by eliminating some which were no longer relevant to the program and by combining some two quarter sequence courses into one semester courses, with the same core requirements (Graduate Survey: AAAS 7753, Methods: AAAS 7754, and Theory :AAAS 7756) retained intact. The approval of the conversion proposal for the MA program and the graduate minor was discussed within the Graduate Studies Committee and presented to the full department faculty. Under the semester system students must complete 36 credit hours to satisfy the requirements for the MA: this includes 9 hours of core requirements, 18 hours in course work (12 in the area of concentration, plus 3 hours from each of the other two concentrations), 6 hours toward the MA thesis or exam, and an additional 3 elective hours. In addition to an area of concentration each graduate student will also select a **focus area, either "cultural studies" or "social studies."** The graduate minor under the semester system will require that students complete 12 credit hours of graduate course work (5000 to 8000-level courses) in the AAAS curriculum. The twelve-hour minor will consist of the 9-hour core requirement for the MA, plus 3 elective hours. Ultimately, the faculty rendered a unanimous vote to approve the conversion of the MA program and the graduate minor in African American and African Studies.

There were two predominate factors in our decision not to make major changes at this time while streamlining and updating the program. First, the department is going through a program review in 2010-2011 and wants the perspective of the external reviewers before launching any major changes. And second, although we do not anticipate any substantial revisions, it was determined that no changes would be made in regard to the Department's graduate curriculum until a Ph.D. program proposal was developed. The last major revision to our M.A. Program was in 2003-

2004 when it was converted from a one year program to a two-year program. Therefore I am recommending that the semester conversions of our graduate programs:

MA in African American and African Studies
Graduate Minor in African American and African Studies

1. Proactively develop and follow an academic plan in consultation with your Faculty advisor.
2. Fulfill the Core Requirements as laid out in the Graduate Studies Program Handbook
3. Select a focus area and fulfill the course requirements as outlined in the Graduate Studies Program Handbook

Students completing a quarter-plus-semester degree program will receive approximately the same amount of instruction, and the changes to the calendar and to courses will not affect the quality of the AAAS Graduate Program. The Department of African American and African Studies has completed and submitted its proposals for the semester versions of its graduate programs:

Graduate Minor in AAAS
MA in AAAS
Ph.D. in AAAS—new program under semesters

The Arts and Humanities Disciplinary Advisory Panel for Curriculum within the College of Arts and Sciences reviewed the proposals on February 25, 2011, provided feedback to the department, and unanimously approved the programs during its meeting on May 11, 2011. We are now forwarding them for review at the Graduate School and Council on Academic Affairs.

Most specifically, I have highlighted the important changes and aspects for the programs below:

Graduate Minor in African American and African Studies: The graduate minor was first approved previous to 2006 as there are no ASC records to indicate otherwise. After discussion and preparation for its program review in 2010-2011, the department chose to convert the graduate minor with some changes, and has retained its quarter concentrations: African American Studies, African Studies, and Comparative Diaspora Studies. The quarter-based degree was 20 credit hours and its semester-based version is 12 credit hours. The core course of 7756 (756) is retained under semesters with the addition of two courses to the core: 7753 and 7754. The inclusion of these three courses as the foundation mirror the MA and PhD core course requirements and provide a solid foundation of understanding for their students. In order to complete the minor, students then select one course from a list of electives. The transition statement that the department has submitted is addressed to the graduate students, and courses counted under quarters will be counted under semesters. As indicated in their transition plan, faculty will work individually with each student to provide the individual advising necessary to complete the Graduate Minor.

Master of Arts in African American and African Studies: The MA in African American and African Studies was first approved previous to 2006 as there are no ASC records to indicate otherwise. Revisions to the program were approved by CAA in academic year 2003-2004 when the one-year program at that time converted to a two-year MA. After discussion and preparation for its program review in 2010-2011, the department chose to convert the MA with minimal changes, and has retained its quarter core courses: 7753, (753), 7754 (754), and 7756 (756). The same quarter requirements of 9 hours of the core courses, 18 hours in the focus area, and 3 hours in the breadth area are required under semesters. Students select from one of three areas of concentration: African American Studies, African Studies or Comparative African Diaspora Studies. Each concentration of African American Studies and African Studies are comprised of two focus areas. Diaspora Studies concentration area is comprised of only a list of courses without a focus area as this area is still growing. The MA also retains its two options: Thesis Plan with 30 credits of course work, 6 hours of thesis, and an oral exam, and a Non-Thesis Plan with 36 credits of course work, a comprehensive written examination, and an oral defense. Like the Graduate Minor, the transition statement that the department has submitted is addressed to the graduate students, and courses

counted under quarters will be counted under semesters. As indicated in their transition plan, faculty will work individually with each student to provide the individual advising necessary to complete the Graduate Minor.

PhD in African American and African Studies: The PhD in African American and African Studies is a *new* program created by the department from its discussions for preparation for its program review. The Graduate Studies Committee and full faculty worked throughout the Winter and Spring to create the new PhD. The college review committee provided feedback throughout this process, and ultimately approved the new graduate degree on May 11, 1011. For students entering with a BA, the program is made up of the MA of 36 hours, the PhD coursework of 36 hours, and 15 hours of dissertation and prospectus, for a total of 87 hours for the PhD. Students not completing their MA from Ohio State, but who instead, enter with 30 credit hours of MA credit from outside the institution, are required to take the three foundational courses of 7753, (753), 7754 (754), and 7756 (756), and then continue with the 36 hours of PhD coursework and 15 hours of dissertation and prospectus, for a total of 90 hours for the PhD. Like the Graduate Minor and MA, students select from one of three areas of concentration: African American Studies, African Studies, or Comparative African Diaspora Studies. Each concentration of African American Studies and African Studies are comprised of two focus areas. Diaspora Studies concentration area is comprised of only a list of courses without a focus area, because this area is still growing. The college is excited to see the development of the doctoral program and fully supports this new Ph.D. Please note that there is a letter of support from Executive Dean and Vice Provost Joseph Steinmetz among the proposal.

We are sending these programs forward for review and approval in the next stage of curricular review at The Graduate School and Council of Academic Affairs. The courses that are specific to the program are listed under AAAS in PACER, and have been advanced along with the program form. All programs from AAAS have the approval of Arts and Humanities. 

In addition to an area of concentration each graduate student will also select a **focus area, either "cultural studies" or "social studies."** The graduate minor under the semester system will require that students complete 12 credit hours of graduate course work (5000 to 8000-level courses) in the AAAS curriculum. The twelve-hour minor will consist of the 9-hour core requirement for the MA, plus 3 elective hours. Ultimately, the faculty rendered a unanimous vote to approve the conversion of the MA program and the graduate minor in African American and African Studies.

There were two predominate factors in our decision not to make major changes at this time while streamlining and updating the program. First, the department is going through a program review in 2010-2011 and wants the perspective of the external reviewers before launching any major changes. And second, although we do not anticipate any substantial revisions, it was determined that no changes would be made in regard to the Department's graduate curriculum until a Ph.D. program proposal was developed. The last major revision to our M.A. Program was in 2003-

2004 when it was converted from a one year program to a two-year program. Therefore I am recommending that the semester conversions of our graduate programs:

MA in African American and African Studies
Graduate Minor in African American and African Studies

In the planning and implementing of its conversion from quarters to semesters for summer 2012, The Ohio State University and its Department of African American and African Studies (AAAS) are committed to protecting the academic progress of students. You should find that the shift from quarters to semesters does not disrupt progress toward your degrees if you

1. Proactively develop and follow an academic plan in consultation with your Faculty advisor.
2. Fulfill the Core Requirements as laid out in the Graduate Studies Program Handbook
3. Select a focus area and fulfill the course requirements as outlined in the Graduate Studies Program Handbook

Students completing a quarter-plus-semester degree program will receive approximately the same amount of instruction, and the changes to the calendar and to courses will not affect the quality of the AAAS Graduate Program. Tuition (general and instructional fees) for a year under the semester system will not cost any more than tuition under the quarter system, and the change should not adversely affect your financial aid.

To ensure that the conversion will not harm your progress, The AAAS Graduate Studies Committee and your faculty advisor will continue to provide detailed guidance concerning of what you will need to receive the M.A. and Graduate Minor. Your Faculty advisor will understand how the changes in courses and curricula may affect students' programs, will know where and how programs can be flexible, and will be prepared to assist you in planning your remaining semesters toward graduation. Good planning around your academic program will be particularly important, and the Graduate Studies Committee and your faculty advisor will provide that support to students who begin their academic career under quarters and complete it under semesters.

Students' records will vary considerably, and each student's plan will need to be determined individually. Every student will be responsible for getting and using the advice essential to assure progress toward his or her degree. Advising is a joint endeavor, and we are confident that students and their advisors, working together, can develop effective plans leading to timely graduation within the context of converting to semesters.
