



Arts and Sciences is pleased to submit the following programs from the Arts and Humanities Division to the Office of Academic Affairs for conversion from quarters to semesters. The programs have been approved by the faculty members and chair of the originating unit, and reviewed and approved by the divisional advisory panel, a subcommittee of the ASC Committee on Curriculum and Instruction (CCI), and the full CCI. The vote for approval of all programs at the full CCI was unanimous.

Arts and Sciences General Education (GE) Program: The GE program for untagged B.A. and B.S. degrees in Arts and Sciences was approved by the Council on Academic Affairs on May 26, 2010, after receiving approval from the Arts and Sciences Faculty Senate. All the programs presented here follow the approved GE program.

College of Arts and Sciences Transition Policy: The College of Arts and Sciences is committed to the principles outlined in the university's Pledge to Undergraduate Students. Each unit has a plan on how best to assist its majors and minors through the transition. And the Arts and Sciences Academic Advising Services will advise students on how to transition their GE program. Dual advising is the existing process used in Arts and Sciences and will continue under semesters.

Additional Notes on NELC Programs:

Note that the Islamic Studies major is not a new program. The program code was not in curriculum.osu.edu, so it was entered as new.

During the review of the NELC programs the CCI had the following comments on the programs. In order to expedite the review at CAA, we are forwarding the programs without making the final revisions. The final changes will incorporate these modifications, along with any additional changes recommended by CAA.

1) Arabic BA (return)

a) Reviewers: Masters, Stafford

i) The advising sheet, as in the proposal, may be confusing for the students. The categories are not consistently named (that is, overview of major in other parts of proposal uses other category names) and the sample schedule may discourage students to enroll in other courses.

ii) 4998 is listed twice in the course list on page 4.

iii) The thesis courses, because they cannot count in the major, should be removed from the advising sheet and the curricular map.

iv) Advising sheet and curricular map should specify whether the courses are NELC or Arabic (for all courses). Some courses (4999 and 4998) have no listing. Does that mean they can be taken in any listing?

b) Motion: Stafford, Masters, unanimously approved (items in bold will be transmitted to CAA)

2) Arabic Minor (return)

a) Reviewers: Stafford, Masters

i) "Fill-in" semester advising sheet: Add that 2241, 2701, and 2702 can only be taken if not taken as prereqs.

ii) Section 12: includes information that is not relevant to the minor-information on renumbering courses.

b) Motion: Stafford, Masters, unanimously approved (items in bold will be transmitted to CAA)

3) Hebrew BA (return)

a) Reviewers: Daniels, Vaessin

i) Program requirements, point 11: uses sections A, B, C, and E- D is missing.

ii) Language requirements on the program requirements are not indicated as being taught in the language but are in other places in the document.

iii) The thesis courses, because they cannot count in the major, should be removed from the advising sheet and the curricular map.

iv) List of program requirements and the advising sheet do not match. 2105 and 4101 have the wrong number of credit hours. Should be listed as 4 credit hours on the advising sheet.

v) 2105, formerly 205, is converting from 5 quarter hours to 4 semester hours--that is, if the information under pt 11 and the course list are correct (indeed, the advising sheet says that 2105 will be 3 credits). Normally a 5-cr quarter course would convert to a 3-cr semester course. Students who take the course under quarters will be short 1 credit hour. A statement that the course will convert to 4 credit hours for these students should be included.

vi) Sample schedule on advising sheet may discourage students to enroll in other courses.

b) Motion: Vaessin, Stafford, unanimously approved (items in bold will be transmitted to CAA)

4) Hebrew Minor (return)

a) Reviewers: Daniels, Vaessin

i) Lack of consistency: Various headers for same category: "Translated Hebrew Literature/Culture," "Literature in Translation," and "Translated Hebrew Literature."

ii) Language requirements on the program requirements are not indicated as being taught in the language but are in other places in the document.

iii) 2105, formerly 205, is converting from 5 quarter hours to 4 semester hours. Normally a 5-cr quarter course would convert to a 3-cr semester course. Students who take the course under quarters will be short 1 credit hour. A statement that the course will convert to 4 credit hours for these students should be included.

b) Motion: Daniels, Vaessin, unanimously approved (items in bold will be transmitted to CAA)

5) Islamic Studies BA (return)

a) Reviewers: Stafford, Masters

i) On the semester advising sheet, specify that a total of 8 hours of language courses are required.

ii) Advising sheet should remove the Social Science GE section.

iii) The "Religious Studies" category name is not consistent on the advising sheet and the program requirements (where it is called "Theory and Methods in the Study of Religion").

iv) 2nd page of the advising sheet identifies the listing for all courses except for a few including 4998 and 4999. Is this to allow them to take from any NELC area?

v) Sample schedule on advising sheet may discourage students to enroll in other courses.

6) Persian Minor (return)

a) Reviewers: Masters, Stafford

i) Letter from chair is missing.

ii) On the ASC version of the advising sheet: 2241 is listed as fulfilling the Literature and Culture category, but this course is not listed as fulfilling Literature and Culture on the department advising sheet or in part 11, C.

iii) Add a note on the department advising sheet and to part 11, C: those courses taken as a prerequisite cannot count in the minor.

b) Motion: Stafford, Masters, unanimously approved (items in bold will be transmitted to CAA)

7) Turkish Minor (return)

a) Reviewers: Masters, Stafford

i) Categories are not consistently labeled: ex. the translation category.

The Department of Near Eastern Languages and Cultures has completed and submitted their proposals for semester versions of their undergraduate major and minor programs:

BA in Arabic
BA in Hebrew
BA in Islamic Studies
Minor in Arabic
Minor in Hebrew
Minor in Turkish
Minor in Persian

The Arts and Humanities Disciplinary Advisory Panel for Curriculum within the College of Arts and Sciences reviewed, approved with contingencies, and deferred ultimate approval of all NECL undergrad programs to CCI, during its June 8, 2011 meeting. Please note that the BA in Arabic, BA in Hebrew, and BA in Islamic Studies programs have an assessment plan on file with OAA, verified October 15, 2010. All programs are converting with re-envisioned status due to changes in pre-requisite requirements and variations in programmatic offerings.

Transition Plan: The programs have identified either a bridge course or individualized instruction for 1101-1103 course work for the pre-requisite requirements for each program. These plans are outlined in the program proposal, and each program varies slightly depending on the number of students enrolled. In addition, the department has identified how very few students will be affected in the Hebrew program and Islamic Studies program, and it has made individualized provision for these six or eight students. Students enrolled in the Arabic program will be aided by two additional GA hires for the 2012-2013 academic year. Detailed scenarios for students entering each major at different years are in each major program plan.

Most specifically, I have highlighted the important changes for each program below:

BA in Arabic: The BA in Arabic was last revised and approved by CAA previous to 2006 as there are no ASC or CAA electronic records on file. The undergraduate BA is changing with re-envisioned status. The quarter-based degree is a minimum of 55 credit hours with 20 credit hours in pre-requisites, and its semester-based version is 36 credit hours with 15 credit hours of pre-requisites. The BA in Arabic is being brought in line with similar BA programs within the languages and is adding a pre-requisite culture course chosen from among three courses: Arabic 2241 Culture of the Contemporary Arab World, Arabic 2701 Classical and Medieval Arabic Literature in Translation, or Arabic 2702 Arabic Lit in Translation to its pre-requisite requirement of 1101-1103. The requirement for the major program under quarters was 11 courses and under semesters will be 11 courses. The program has changed the grammar sequence from three 5 credit quarter hour courses to three 4 credit semester hour courses so that their students will continue to be competitive for graduate programs around the country. This change in the grammar

sequence along with the added culture pre-requisite course is the major reason for the re-envisioned status. The rest of the program remains the same.

BA in Hebrew: The BA in Hebrew was last revised and approved by CAA previous to 2006 as there are no ASC or CAA electronic records on file. The undergraduate BA is changing with re-envisioned status. The quarter-based degree is a minimum of 45 credit hours with 20 credit hours in pre-requisites, and its semester-based version is 32 credit hours with 15 credit hours of pre-requisites. The BA in Hebrew is being brought in line with similar BA programs within the languages and is adding a pre-requisite culture course chosen from among three courses: Hebrew 2241 Culture of Contemporary Israel, Hebrew 2245 Israeli Film and Society, or Hebrew 2216 Medieval Jewish Experience to its pre-requisite requirement of 1101-1103. The requirements for the major program under quarters were 9 courses and under semesters will be 10 courses. The program has changed the grammar sequence from two 5 credit quarter hour courses to two 4 credit semester hour courses, and under semesters will require that an additional three courses be taken in the language using only Hebrew texts. This requirement ensures that their students will continue to be competitive for graduate programs around the country. This change in the grammar sequence, the added culture pre-requisite course, and the additional requirement of three courses that use Hebrew texts are the major reasons for the re-envisioned status. The rest of the program remains the same.

BA in Islamic Studies: The BA in Islamic Studies was last revised and approved by CAA previous to 2006 as there are no ASC or CAA electronic records on file. The undergraduate BA is changing with re-envisioned status. The quarter-based degree is a minimum of 60 credit hours with 20 credit hours in pre-requisites, and its semester-based version is 32 credit hours with only 12 credit hours of pre-requisites. Please note that the BA in Islamic Studies is a long-time major administered within the Department of Near Eastern Languages and Cultures, however within PACER it was not found under NELC, and the department had to list it as new. The categories of the program remain the same with the addition of a Religious Studies categorical requirement of 3 credit hours. They have reduced the number of required courses in the major by two, bringing it into line with the other two programs within the department. This change in the number of courses required to complete the major and the added religious studies categorical requirement are the major reasons for the re-envisioned status. The rest of the program remains the same.

Minor in Arabic: The Minor in Arabic was last revised and approved by CAA previous to 2006 as there are no ASC or CAA electronic records on file. The minor is changing with re-envisioned status. The quarter-based degree is a minimum of 20 credit hours with 20 credit hours in pre-requisites, and its semester-based version is 13 credit hours with 15 credit hours of pre-requisites. The Minor in Arabic, along with all minors from NELC, is being brought into line with similar programs within the languages and is adding a pre-requisite culture course chosen from among three courses: Arabic 2241 Culture of the Contemporary Arab World, Arabic 2701 Classical and Medieval Arabic Literature in Translation, or Arabic 2702 Arabic Lit in Translation to its pre-requisite requirement of 1101-1103. The requirement for the minor program under quarters was 4 courses and under semesters will be 4 courses. However, the department has provided choices for students who wish to either take the traditional Modern Standard Arabic sequence, or the Colloquial Arabic sequence, which will complement the International Studies BA minor requirements.

Minor in Hebrew: The Minor in Hebrew was last revised and approved by CAA previous to 2006 as there are no ASC or CAA electronic records on file. The minor is changing with re-envisioned status. The quarter-based degree is a minimum of 20 credit hours with 20 credit hours in pre-requisites, and its semester-based version is 14 credit hours with 15 credit hours of pre-requisites. The Minor in Hebrew, along with all minors from NELC, is being brought in line with similar programs within the languages and is adding a pre-requisite culture course chosen from among three courses: Hebrew 2241 Culture of Contemporary Israel, Hebrew 2245 Israeli Film and Society, or Hebrew 2216 Medieval Jewish Experience to its pre-requisite requirement of 1101-1103. The requirement for the minor program under quarters was 4 courses and under semesters will be 4 courses.

Minor in Persian: The Minor in Persian was last revised and approved by CAA previous to 2006 as there are no ASC or CAA electronic records on file. The minor is changing with re-envisioned status. The quarter-based degree is a minimum of 20 credit hours with 20 credit hours in pre-requisites, and its semester-based version is 15 credit hours with 15 credit hours of pre-requisites. The Minor in Persian, along with all minors from NELC, is being brought into line with similar programs within the languages and is adding a pre-requisite culture course chosen from among three courses: Persian 2241 Persian Culture, Persian 2301 Persian Mythology and Folklore, or Persian 2701 Persian Literature in Translation to its pre-requisite requirement of 1101-1103. The requirement for the minor program under quarters was 4 courses and under semesters will be 4 courses.

Minor in Turkish: The Minor in Turkish was last revised and approved by CAA previous to 2006 as there are no ASC or CAA electronic records on file. The minor is changing with re-envisioned status. The quarter-based degree is a minimum of 20 credit hours with 20 credit hours in pre-requisites, and its semester-based version is 15 credit hours with 15 credit hours of pre-requisites. The Minor in Turkish, along with all minors from NELC, is being brought into line with similar programs within the languages and is adding a pre-requisite culture course Turkish 2241 Turkish Culture to its pre-requisite requirement of 1101-1103. The department has also added a new 3000-level syntax course, and formalized specific requirements for the semester version of its minor program. The requirement for the minor program under quarters was 4 courses and under semesters will be 4 courses.

We are sending these undergraduate programs forward for review and approval in the next stage of curricular review at the Arts and Sciences Committee on Curriculum and Instruction. The courses that are specific to all of the programs are listed under multiple Book 3 Listings. Near Eastern Languages and Cultures faculty is recommending for approval its plan for conversion to semesters from quarters. The programs in the unit are our three undergraduate majors: Islamic Studies, Arabic and Hebrew; five undergraduate minors: Arabic, Hebrew, Turkish, Persian and South Asian Studies; an MA in NELC and a PhD in NELC. There are no undergraduate tracks. These are the same programs that we offered under the quarter system but re-envisioned as we took advantage of the conversion to review all courses and programs together in order to think again about an overall vision for NELC. In the process, the changes we ultimately agreed to are not extensive, but significant as we identified and remediated course lacunae, improved language progression for undergraduates, and identified new core courses for our MA and PhD students.

The Department has the following majors and minors (numbers represent Spring, 2011)

ARABIC:	MAJ: 84	MIN: 43	PERSIAN:	MIN: 12
HEBREW:	MAJ: 11	MIN: 16	SO ASIA STUDIES:	MIN: 8
ISLAMIC STUDIES:	MAJ: 11	N/A	TURKISH:	MIN: 4

Our PhD graduate program in NELC is relatively new, but we have 12 active MA students and 14 active PhD students. We expect more than half of these graduate students, mostly MA students, to finish by or before summer of 2012. Entering MA and PhD students (6) will be individually counseled from the beginning to ensure a smooth transition to semesters.

The following are issues we addressed in general for our undergraduate and graduate programs as we prepared our transition documents:

For the undergraduate programs, we:

1. Made the major programs more comparable in terms of expectations and did the same for the minor programs
2. Kept in mind that our mission includes not only language and literature, but also culture and made adjustments to be sure students could focus on the cultural dimensions of the languages they study

3. Tried to balance courses to give students the opportunity to focus on either ancient/medieval or modern periods (for example by adding a new course on contemporary Israeli and Palestinian literature) for both Hebrew and Arabic
4. Addressed the lack of interaction among the various languages by offering culture courses that bring together speakers of diverse languages
5. Made the Islamic Studies major program more broadly Islamic, thus including the large number of Muslims that live outside of the Middle East as conventionally defined
6. Assured that minor programs in Arabic, Hebrew, Persian and Turkish all require $\frac{3}{4}$ of their courses to be in the chosen language
7. For the first time, have advising sheets for all major and minor programs
8. Have appended a sample four year program to our Arabic and Hebrew major advising sheets
9. For the language courses that are part of intermediate sequences, we have continued with the 4 credit hour semesters, due to the challenges for English speakers of learning Middle Eastern languages, and in order to ensure that our students finish in four years and are competitive with students at other universities, whether in job searches or graduate education
10. Will offer Arabic 1103 intensively in the May Session as an experiment to allow some students to finish their entire GE language requirement in one academic year.

Changes specific to individual programs are addressed in the materials provided under #12 in each programs "rationale for proposed program changes" for individual program proposals both major and minor.

For the graduate programs, we:

1. Remediated our lack of core courses and at the same time remediated our lack of focus at the graduate level on academic concentrations other than language. Consequently, we addressed our students' perceived weakness in foundational theory by ensuring that students take one core course that addresses general theories of orality and literacy, and at least one course that is foundational to their theoretical specialization (literature, culture, religion).

Thus:

All graduate students are required to take NELC 5568: Studies in Orality and Literacy (cross listed with CS: 5668)

Graduate Students focusing on religious study also take CS 7370: Theorizing Religion

Graduate Students focusing on literature also take CS/NELC 7301: Theorizing Literature

Graduate Students focusing on culture also take CS 7360: Theorizing Culture

2. Adjusted the credit requirements of our graduate programs to accord with the credit hours suggested by the Graduate School.

Our MA will require 30 credit hours in courses at the 5000 level and above (typically 9 credit hours at the 5000 level, 6 at the 6000 level and 5 at the 7000 level and above taken over two years. The final semester should be left free for the writing of the MA thesis or preparation for MA examinations.

Since the MA now requires 55 credit hours, the newly implemented benchmark of 30 in semester credit hours reduces the MA by almost seven graduate credit hours, or more than two courses. Because of the higher competency among entering graduate students, we have

been able to reduce required language courses at the 5000 level by half. And, core theory courses have been reduced from three to two.

The PhD will require 80 credit hours or 50 following the MA. This requires a reduction of a further 3- 9 converted semester credit hours, or one- three more courses for a reduction of 9-15 semester credit hours in total for the MA/PhD, depending on the number of credit hours MA students are allowed to carry over, from what we previously have required. We have further remedied this at the PhD level by streamlining requirements for the second Near Eastern language for students who need only reading for research. With this system, the secondary language could require as few as four courses or 12 credit hours--a product of our ability during this conversion process to clarify and better define the level of competency graduate students will need to acquire in their languages as well as in related theory and culture courses.

Transition Plan:

Many of our plans for transition are language specific and are reviewed in the program document for each major, minor or graduate program. Most advising will be conducted on an individual basis by our five language instructors for Arabic, Hebrew, Persian, Turkish and Hindi, along with our staff advisor, Stafford Noble, and the faculty semester conversion contact, Sabra Webber. We have also requested one time funding of two quarters (winter and spring 2012) and two semesters (fall and spring 2012-2013) for two graduate student advisors, principally for Arabic majors and minors. Individual meetings will be schedule for all approximately 200 majors and minors and in-class meetings will be held for all students taking their GEC/GE in a NELC language.

Individual graduate faculty will work closely with their advisees as the semester program unfurls.

12. Rationale for proposed program changes:

Under the quarter system, the Islamic Studies major requires 60 credits, in addition to pre-

requisite language courses (Arabic, Turkish or Persian 101-104). Students are required to take two more language courses in Arabic, Persian, or Turkish at the Intermediate level. They must then take two history courses, one of which is History 340, Islam, Politics and Society in History. They must take NELC 680 (Basic Bibliographic and Reference Tools in Near Eastern Languages and Cultures) and NELC 372 (Literatures and Cultures of the Islamic World); and either Arabic 626 (Introduction to the Arabic Qur'an) or Arabic 671 (The Qur'an in Translation). They must then take one of the NELC 241 culture courses, and either one of the 371/372 literature courses housed in NELC or NELC 351 Introduction to Islam. They then can select 3 courses from a list spanning six departments on campus that offer courses relevant to the topic for a total of 12 courses under the quarter system.

We have reduced this requirement of 12 courses under the quarter system courses to 10 in semesters for the Islamic Studies major, but have added additional structure as we have to all NELC majors and minors. For the Islamic Studies major we have brought credit hours in line with the parameters of the other NELC majors (Arabic and Hebrew) as well as with other majors in the Humanities. We now require only one history, one culture, and one literature course so students can then build with their three electives on the disciplinary, regional, and era focuses they prefer. Although there is still a large list of electives, these have been culled by about a third from those on the quarter list. We have added one religious studies course so that students can place the study of one religion/religiously identified culture within the parameters of the larger discipline. This addition still eliminates two courses, which makes the total number of semester hours 32 rather than the anticipated 40, or ten courses in addition to the prerequisite three-semester language requirement and one culture course.

15. Rationale for change in credit hours: We have eliminated two courses from this major, which makes the total number of semester hours 32 rather than the anticipated 40, or ten courses in addition to the prerequisite three-semester language requirement and the one culture course. Thus, in the quarter version of the Islamic Studies major students take twelve courses. In the semester version only ten are required—which brings it more into line with the other two NELC majors as well as with other majors in Humanities.

TRANSITION POLICY

16. Policy statement from the chair of the department

In the quarter version of the Islamic Studies major students take twelve courses. In the semester version only ten are required (not counting the prerequisite requirement of 1101-1103)

The transition will require no additional coursework for any students, regardless of their status at the time of transition. Because a language requirement depends on a progression of courses in the language, we will first establish that all of those courses taught in Persian, Arabic or Turkish will be accommodated and then proceed progressively through as many of the courses taught in English as is possible without, again, requiring more than 32 credit hours.

Due to the large numbers of Arabic students, transition is more challenging than it is for Turkish or Persian, as we will have to allow students to register each quarter of 2011-12 for Arabic 101. At the moment we expect that the other two languages can begin next year only in the fall quarter, those allowing students who will be majoring to move directly into the new semester 1103. With our intensive Arabic summer program, students will also have the opportunity to take, for example, a final 103 so that they may in the fall move seamlessly into 1103.
