PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS

10. **Program learning goals:**

The objective of the interdisciplinary M.A. in Slavic and East European Studies is to prepare students for professional or academic careers requiring language and area studies expertise in the areas of Russia, Eastern Europe, and Eurasia (REE&E). This includes the following learning goals:

- a. *Background:* M.A. students specializing in Slavic and East European Studies will gain a thorough grounding in and appreciation of interdisciplinary knowledge related to REE&E so that they will have the necessary background to pursue professional careers (government, nonprofit sector, private sector) or further academic degrees.
- b. *Language Preparation:* M.A. students specializing in Slavic and East European Studies will develop their language proficiency skills in one or two languages of the area as the first language Oral Proficiency Interview (OPI) reaches Intermediate Mid and the second language to the Novice High level.
- c. *Interdisciplinary Area Studies Knowledge:* M.A. students will receive a comprehensive interdisciplinary knowledge of the area and will have a full appreciation of cultural, political, and social issues of East European, Russian, and Eurasian societies.
- d. *Professionalization:* M.A. students specializing in Slavic and East European Studies will become familiar with the major professional institutions, genres, conventions, and requirements in the fields so that they will be able to give effective presentations of their research at conferences, as well as will gain a valuable career and work experience through internships.

11. **Semester course requirements:** (See attachment #3 for course list including all 23 departments' courses which relate to our M.A. degree)

- 1) Introduction to Slavic Studies (3 credit hours)
 - Slavic 6501 Introduction to Slavic Studies (3 credit hours)
- 2) Area or Discipline of Concentration (at least 9 credit hours)
 - Courses as approved by advisor

- 3) Electives at the 6000-8000 level (at least 9 credit hours)
 - Courses as approved by advisor
- 4) Electives at the 5000 level (no more than 6 credit hours)
 - Courses (must carry graduate credit) as approved by advisor
- 5) REE&E Studies Forum (1-2 credit hours, min 2 credit hours)
 - Slavic 6500 Slavic Literature, Film and Culture Forum (1 credit hour; repeatable for credit, min 2)

12. Rationale for proposed program changes: The Graduate School has mandated a minimum of 30 hours for M.A. programs. Our current quarter M.A. program, last updated in 2006, consists of 60 quarter credit hours, which translates (using the 2/3 rule) into 40 semester credit hours. As most courses our students take are 3 credit hours each, this in turn corresponds to 13.3 courses, which will be difficult for our students to complete within 4 semesters of study, since we also require them to take language classes (minimum 1, but 2 strongly encouraged) every semester. We propose the new semester M.A. program to consist of 38 semester credit hours (plus 12-20 credit hours of language study), which will be manageable and guarantee quality and rigor of education.

Requirement #1: This is a continuation of the quarter-system practice, with new course number and credits.

Requirement #2: This is a continuation the quarter-system practice, with clarification of the credit hours required. CSEES' M.A. program is interdisciplinary and individualized. The student's Area of Concentration can be either disciplinary (history, political science, etc.) or geographic (Russia, Eastern Europe, Central Asia, etc.) in nature, or some combination of the two. Students have flexibility when choosing their Area of Concentration and may tailor their plan of study to meet their academic interests and career goals.

Requirement #3: This is a continuation of the quarter-system practice, with clarification of the levels (6000-8000) of courses that can be counted.

Requirement #4: This continues the practice of the quarter-based program. Students will be allowed to take a maximum of 6 credit hours at the 5000 level. These courses must carry graduate credit.

TRANSITION POLICY

19. Policy statement from the director of the department

CSEES will ensure that students who have begun their M.A. with a specialization in Slavic and East European Studies under the current quarter system will not have their progress to the degree delayed by the change to semesters. All of the required and elective courses in the proposed program currently exist in quarter-system format and will be offered in their ordinary rotations during academic years 2011–12 (the last year of the quarter system) and 2012–13 (the first year of the semester system). This will allow students to complete their two-year M.A. programs seamlessly. Advisors will meet with entering students in Autumn 2011 to map out a viable program of electives spanning the two years of the transition. If, for whatever reason, a student is unable to take a necessary course during this period, the Graduate Studies Committee will find a suitable substitution; such variances will be handled on a case-by-case basis, with the understanding that all students entering in Autumn 2011 must be able to complete their M.A. by the Spring of 2013.

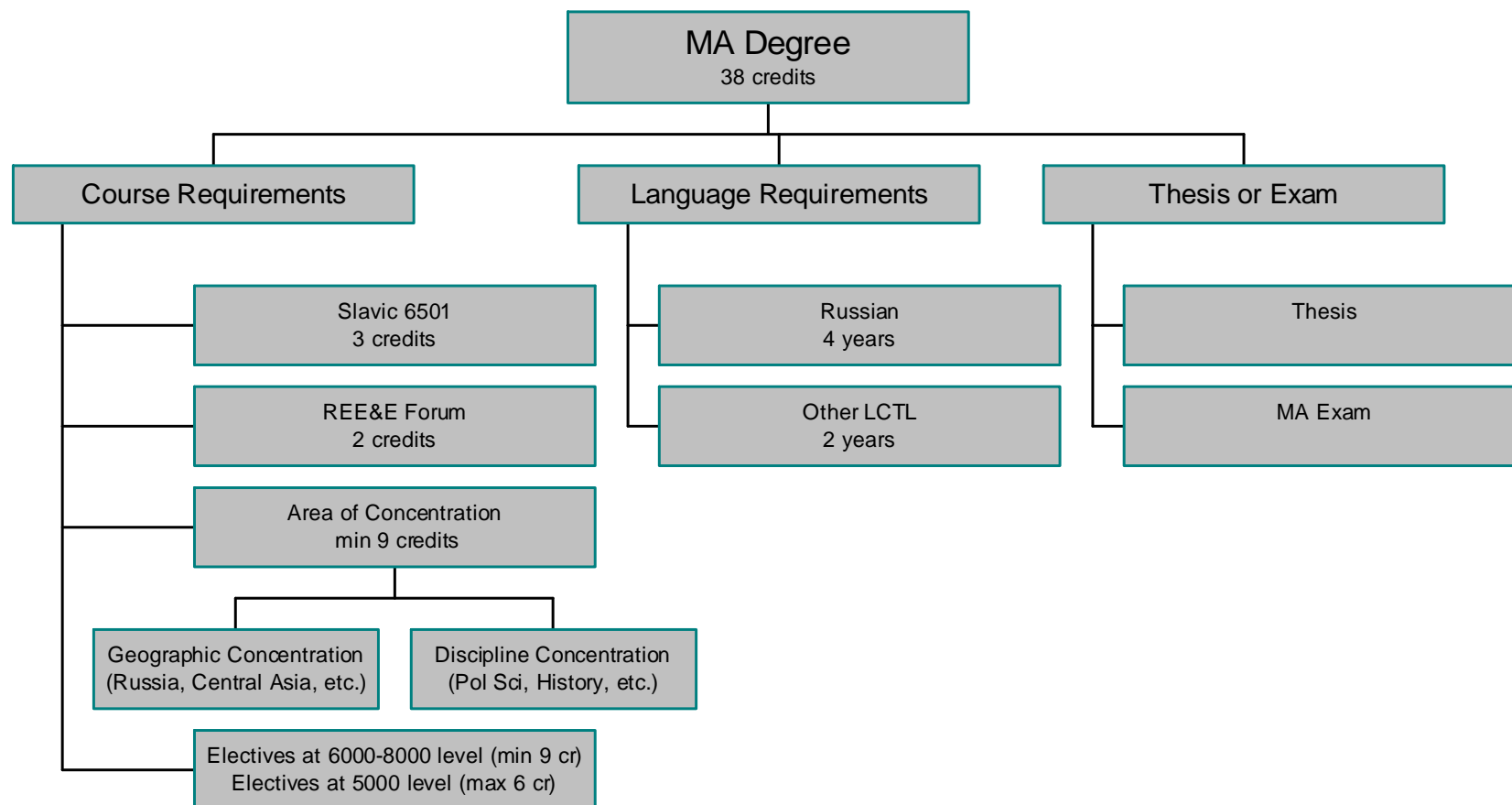

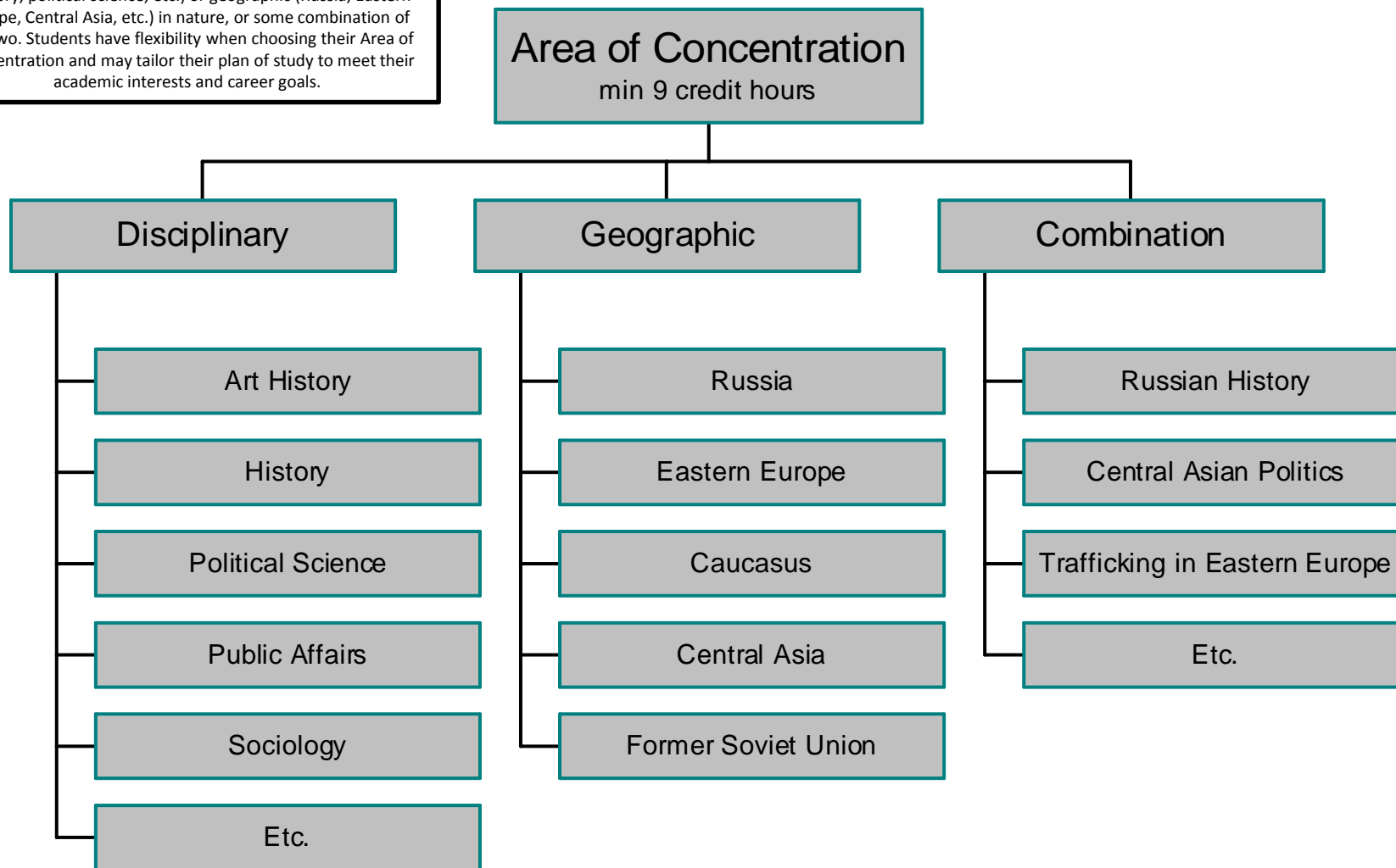
