Please find enclosed a proposal for minor adjustments to our two undergraduate majors, the Bachelor of Science (BS) in Public Policy Analysis and the Bachelor of Arts (BA) in Public Management, Leadership & Policy. Since the creation of our majors, our college has grown in terms of faculty, course offerings, and the numbers of course sections during a semester. As such, we propose to make changes to expand our writing requirement (adding another writing course option) in both degrees. For our BS degree, we are offering more sections of courses that align directly with our degree goals, therefore we are less reliant on substitute courses. For our BA degree, we now offer more advanced classes, and we want students to be able to take more courses that directly align with degree goals.

We thank the committee for their investment of time to review this request and welcome any feedback.

BACHELOR OF SCIENCE IN PUBLIC POLICY ANALYSIS

Proposed changes and rationale.

Given the growth of our programming and faculty, we are suggesting the following changes to the Bachelor of Science in Public Policy Analysis:

- We currently require PUBAFRS 2367: Writing and Communication in Public Affairs. We have added the following course this academic year: PUBAFRS 2368: Nonprofit Communications and Grant Writing. PUBAFRS 2368 was designed to serve the same role in our curriculum as PUBAFRS 2367 while focusing on the nonprofit sector rather than the public sector. As such, we propose allowing students to choose to take either PUBAFRS 2367 or 2368 as their advanced writing course.
- Because our capacity has increased, we are able to offer more sections of PUBAFRS 4030 Public Budgeting and PUBAFRS 4310 State and Government Finance to accommodate students. When we created our degree, we needed to include other courses that could substitute for these courses. We propose removing Economics 4300 and 4320 as substitutes, keeping Economics 4001. However, we appreciate students who double major in Economics and Public Policy Analysis and recognize that these students will be equipped to understand the intersections of economics and public policy analysis. As such, we will continue to allow these students to substitute Economics 4300 and 4320. Academic advisors will be able to make this substitution for these students as appropriate.

BACHELOR OF ARTS IN PUBLIC MANAGEMENT, LEADERSHIP & POLICY

Proposed changes and rationale.

Given the growth of our programming and faculty, we are suggesting the following changes to the Bachelor of Arts in Public Management, Leadership & Policy:

- We currently require PUBAFRS 2367: Writing and Communication in Public Affairs. We have added the following course this academic year: PUBAFRS 2368: Nonprofit Communications and Grant Writing. PUBAFRS 2368 was designed to serve the same role in our curriculum as PUBAFRS 2367 while focusing on the nonprofit sector rather than the public sector. As such, we propose allowing students to choose to take either PUBAFRS 2367 or 2368 as their advanced writing course.
- Because our capacity has increased, we now offer several more advanced courses than when our undergraduate degrees were created. Currently, students are required to take one 3000+ Political Science course and one 4000+ Public Affairs course. We propose changing these requirements to students taking two 4000+ Public Affairs courses. Advanced Public Affairs courses are already designed to align with our degree goals. However, we appreciate the number of students who double major in Political Science and Public Management, Leadership & Policy and recognize that these students will be equipped to understand the intersections of political science and public management and leadership. As such, we will continue to allow these students to substitute one 3000+ Political Science course for one 4000+ Public Affairs course. Academic advisors will be able to make this substitution for these students as appropriate.

TRANSITION POLICY

This change will go into effect for students enrolling at Ohio State in Autumn 2024 and later. Existing students will continue with the previous curricular requirements but will be able to petition to apply the new rules if it makes sense for their academic pursuits. The college will ensure that no student's time to degree will be negatively impacted by this change.
