- pharmacologic agents and other relevant treatment modalities
- Make informed decisions about diagnostic and therapeutic interventions based on patient information, preferences, up-to-date scientific evidence, and clinical judgment
- Compile thorough medical records, history, and clinical information to facilitate synthesis
 of a thorough problem list
- Create a prioritized differential diagnosis based on patient information, fund of medical knowledge, and principles of epidemiology
- Recognize the indications for and the selection of suitable methods of monitoring or investigation taking into account their test performance characteristics, convenience, reliability, safety, cost and relevance to the patient's condition.
- Develop, implement and evaluate care plans for the treatment and management of acute and chronic pulmonary disease
- Order appropriate tests to confirm or refute a clinical diagnosis
- Demonstrate understanding of imaging techniques, including indications, limitations and therapeutic modalities of basic x-rays, CT scanning, MRI, ultrasound, angiography and radionucleotide studies
- 2. Demonstrate the attributes of a professional member of the health care team.
 - Adhere to basic ethical principles: autonomy, beneficence, nonmaleficence, justice and demonstrate high standards of ethical behavior
 - Demonstrate an attitude of caring derived from humanistic and professional values
 - Demonstrate compassion, integrity, and respect for others
 - Maintain accountability to patients, society, and the profession
 - Demonstrate punctuality, reliability, and follow-through on commitments
 - Prioritize patient needs above self-interest
 - Demonstrate sensitivity and responsiveness to a diverse patient population, including but not limited to, diversity in sex, age, culture, race, religion, disabilities, health problems, and sexual orientation
 - Recognize personal limitations and seek and accept assistance or supervision

1. **Performance**. Written, verified documentation of completion of the goals, objectives, and activities for every assigned clinical.

The student is responsible for keeping track of and reporting clinical activities. A cumulative list of clinical activities available in the Case Logs in E-value is posted in Carmen for the student to use during the clinical experiences to keep track of daily clinical activities. The student is responsible for entering daily clinical activities in the Case Log in E-value by 0100 following the clinical experience.

Each student is be expected to orally present one (1) case during scheduled case presentations and submit a written case presentation based on the oral presentation. Students will select patient cases to present from their clinical rotations. The format will emulate the case presentations students make to their attending physician during clinicals. Students are expected to attend all scheduled case presentations. See Carmen for more information.

If any rating is "U", the maximum grade given for the course will be a "U".

2. **Competence**. Written, verified documentation of competence appropriate for an advanced-level respiratory therapist.

The student is responsible for keeping track of and reporting clinical activities. A cumulative list of clinical activities available in the Case Logs in E-value is posted in Carmen for the student to use during the clinical experiences to keep track of daily clinical activities. The student is responsible for entering daily clinical activities in the Case Log in E-value by 0100 following the clinical experience.

The student MUST select the "*I certify..." statement with every daily Case Log entry.

The student is responsible for selecting the 8189 preceptor when entering daily clinical activities in the Case Log in E-value and including the first and last name of the attending physician they were precepted by in the comments section.

Some clinical sessions will include preparation assignments. See Carmen for assignments and due dates.

The student is responsible for obtaining three (3) completed clinical performance evaluations from attending physicians that have served as their preceptors during clinical experiences. Each completed clinical performance evaluation must be from a different attending physician. The clinical performance evaluation document is posted in Carmen. The attending physician evaluator will complete the clinical performance evaluation on paper. The student is responsible for uploading a picture or scanned file of the clinical performance evaluations to Carmen by the due dates.

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If any rating is "U", the maximum grade given for the course will be a "U".

3. **Attendance**. Written, verified documentation of attendance at every assigned clinical.

Attend all clinical sessions as scheduled. Absences and late arrivals must be reported to both the clinical contact and the director of clinical education BEFORE the absence or late arrival per the policy in the Student Handbook. Make-ups must be arranged with the clinical contact through the director of clinical education and completed according to the policies in the Student Handbook.

The student is responsible for clocking in and out each day of scheduled rotations using Time Tracking in E-value. The student is responsible for selecting the 8189 preceptor when clocking in and out. Remote clock in and clock out will not be accepted unless prior arrangements have been made with the director of clinical education. See E-value policies in Carmen for more information.

4. **Behavior**. Satisfactory professional conduct evaluations from all clinical preceptors.

The student is responsible for obtaining three (3) completed clinical performance

evaluations from attending physicians that have served as their preceptors during clinical experiences. Each completed clinical performance evaluation must be from a different attending physician. The clinical performance evaluation document is posted in Carmen. The attending physician evaluator will complete the clinical performance evaluation on paper. The student is responsible for uploading a picture or scanned file of the clinical performance evaluations to Carmen by the due dates.
